International Bible Lesson for Tomorrow—The Passover—Matthew 26, 17-30.

Golden Text—"For even Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us."

From 13 verses and 30 minutes in which to teach a class the truths contained in the Passover, is impossible, but each teacher must prayerfully do his best.

This memorial feast was first instituted by God through Moses, in Egypt, 1491 before Christ, and pointing to Him, for about 3400, the Jews have commemorated their deliverance from the slavery of Egypt and the passing-over of their first born by the destroying angel who smote Egypt's sons. For 1900 years Christians, directed by our Lord, have commemorated the death of the Son of God as his redeemer and deliverer from sin by the blood of Calvary. Every Israelite was to choose a lamb for his family and kill it on the 14th of their first month, sprinkling the blood on the sides and over the door of his house, and to eat of the lamb with bitter herbs that same night. This was followed by a seven days' feast of unleavened bread. Such was, and in part is, the oldest religious ritual instituted by God for His people we have on record.

This last passover, just before He fulfilled it as the Lamb of God, was heartily desired and looked forward to by the Lord Jesus. See Luke 22, 15-16. On announcing that one of His disciples would betray Him, each asked the humble question, Lord, is it I? Better that way than, is it He? When Judas said, Master, is it I? Jesus' answer implicated him and he left them on his traitorous mission. As they were eating Jesus took the bread and blessed and broke it and gave to the disciples and said, Take, eat; this is my body; and He took the cup and gave thanks and gave to them, saying, Drink ye all of it, for this is my blood of the new covenant which is shed for many unto remission of sins. But I say unto you I will not drink henceforth of this fruit of the vine, until that day I drink it anew with you in my Father's Kingdom. At Lord's table we take our places as living witnesses between two facts—Jesus' death for us and His coming again for us ere long.
