Troubles do not seem to come singly, and Mr. Samuel Jackson is looking after the two places—his own and his brother Ira's at Hill Spring, and owing to the delay in getting the wire couldn't possibly reach Idaho in time for the funeral.

We extend our sympathy in these distressing circumstances and trust the future will hold brighter things in store for those bereaved.

Irrigation Assured For United Project

Following up immediately the announcement made through the Lethbridge and Calgary papers that the C. P. R. was open to approach in the irrigation waters of the Belly River, the trustees, Messrs. S. B. Smith, Geo. L. Stringham, and Edward Leavitt, took train for Calgary on Monday morning.

They had an interview with Mr. F. L. Naismith, of the Natural Resources Department, at noon on Tuesday and were given the assurance that all the water rights to the Belly River, held by the C. P. R. as successor to the A. R. & I. Company who were the first holders, would be waived so as to permit the United Irrigation to proceed with an absolutely clear title to the required amount of water necessary for their project.

This removes all the clouds from the horizon of this project and shows that the big company wishes to encourage the irrigation idea with the farmers of Southern Alberta. Hurrah for Irrigation! Three cheers for Mr. Naismith and the Canadian Pacific Railway!

Quarterly Stake Conference

The Quarterly Conference opened very auspiciously on Saturday at 10 a. m. with an audience of about four hundred people.

All the wards of the Stake were represented except Pine Coulee and Orton, in nearly every case a member of the Bishopric being here. In this end of the Stake all the Bishops were on hand but Mr. A. W. Pitcher, who was ill.

The music the first day was in charge of the Glenwood Ward and they acquitted themselves with credit. Owing to the illness of Mr. Edwin Leavitt, chorister, and his assistant, Mr. Myron Layton, the conducting was in charge of Mr. Jno. E. Layne, of the Bishopric.

In his report of the Stake, Pres Wood referred to the Special Missionaries, the Ward Conferences all completed since February, and the Religion Class Conferences, which had been very successful. The community spirit evidenced in our road work and our tree planting in Cardston and in the improvement of the grounds around our churches at Mr. View, Leavitt, etc. was highly commended.

Miss Jensen rendered very nicely a piano solo, and the duet "Love Divine" was listened to with great pleasure as ably given by Miss Josephine and Mr. Rulon Leavitt. In a very interesting account of his pioneering experiences as a homesteader on his first piece of land, and then referring to the Gospel in Christ's time and in our own as being received by the people in a similar manner, Apostle Richards occupied the pulpit for the balance of the forenoon session.

The two o'clock service gave some attractive musical numbers. Master Dennis Kelley, accompanied by Miss Eda Olsen on the piano, gave two violin selections. He is a wee lad, only about five years old. The ladies quartette "Whip-Poor-Will" by Misses LaVerne and June Leavitt, Alice Greene and LaRue Layne was very pleasingly rendered, as was the favorite "Love's Old Sweet Song". The speakers were Pres. Thos. Duce, his theme "By their fruits ye shall know them", Mr. A. J. Hansen, who gave a very favorable opinion as to the greatness of Alberta, as compared with Utah and Idaho in a productivity agriculturally, and Apostle Richards upon Gospel topics.

Sunday morning there was a large attendance of children and some very enjoyable Community singing in charge of the Assistant Stake Chorister, S. W. Low, who also led the choir very ably during all the sessions of the day. Mr. D. O. Wight gave an account of the Survey Work of the Stake and reported the Social Committee activities as well as the Religion Class organization. An excellent showing has been made in all these labors and no other member of the Social Committee has given the time and study to this survey work so valuable in placing before us the true status of the Stake as to the "Word of Wisdom" and the Priesthood activities. "Mother's Day", its origin and proper observance, was very ably handled by Apostle Richards. There was a piano duet by the Misses Newton also the Boy's Chorus from the 1st Ward in charge of Miss Priscilla Layton, which rendered "A Boy's Best Friend is His Mother."

The afternoon session there was the largest attendance of any of the meetings. The Orchestra in charge of Stake Chorister A. T. Henson, and the Choir united in the hymns for opening and closing. Two selections by the Orchestra were rendered during the service and were very much enjoyed by all. There was also a violin selection by Master Kelley, and a well rendered quartette by Misses Eda and Vivian, and Messrs. Walter and Frank Olsen entitled "Come Where the Lilies Bloom." Apostle Richards was the chief speaker, making his subject as "The Distinguishing Characteristics of the Gospel of Christ", and bore a powerful testimony to the truth of the Latter-day work. The General and Stake Authorities were presented by Pres. Wood, who also spoke strongly on the responsibility of parents.

The evening session was devoted to the Mutuals represented by Mrs. A. W. Lee and Mr. J. W. Low in brief addresses, and they were followed by Apostle Richards in a discourse showing how our belief and the true Gospel Ordinance differed from those of the orthodox churches. The musical numbers were very good—Mrs. Jones giving a piano solo, Mr. Berryessa a cornet solo, Mr. A. B. Cure and Miss Doris Kirk a duet, and Mr. S. W. Low a solo upon the French Horn. This last has not been heard in our midst as a solo instrument for many years, if at all, and it was especially melodious. The musical people are all hereby invited to render congratulations for their able performances.

"The Third Degree" Well Presented

There was a good audience at the play "The Third Degree" presented by the local people on Friday and Saturday evenings. The drama requires some good acting and is rather difficult, but most of the parts were well portrayed. Only three ladies were in the cast, and to Mrs. Ferguson who depicted "Annie Jeffries", no little praise is due. While Miss Ethel Oaldwell was rather young for the part assigned her, she did her herself credit by attempting this rather difficult part. Miss Mary Gleau also acquitted herself with honors, although hers was a minor part.

Of the gentleman, Mr. Wm. Duce as "Richard Brewster" gave as usual a very good portrayal of the character, and Mr. W. A. Keith in a difficult part also did well as "Howard Jeffries". As his dissipated son, Mr. B. Kpowlton had some very heavy work in

the character of "Howard Jeffries Jr." and acquitted himself creditably. The big detective known as "Captain Clouton" was assigned to Ms. Chas. Cheesman, and he lived up to his opportunities. Dr. Bernstein was the part of Mr. S. D. Cahoon, "Robert Underwood" that of Mr. Henry Atkins, "Mr. Beuington" that of Mr. Irvine Olsen. These all carried on with good ability.

Many expressions were heard by those in attendance as to the good work of these local people in this latest dramatic attempt and we believe that all thoroughly enjoyed it. To many of us this is a far better entertainment than in witnessing professionals perform. It shows the native ability as well as the hard work and its effect upon those who participate in these efforts.

Musical and Dramatic Treat Next Wednesday and Thursday
