

FROM MONTREAL.

Mysterious Disappearance of an Englishman.

MONTREAL, April 25.—This has been a hard year for gamblers, robbers and that class of people generally. The memory of Fred Walton's arrest by Detectives Grose in St. John, N. B., on the 22d February last, charged with stealing \$35,000 of the Pacific Express Company's funds in Dallas, Texas, has scarcely left the public mind, when Montreal is treated to a sequel, which is of far greater interest to the community than the story itself. It was on the 2nd of February that it was that Walton left his home with a part of the money in question and made for the Canadian lines. Before coming north, however, the absconder entrusted \$17,000 to a woman in Dallas. Amongst other distinguished acquaintances whom Walton met in Montreal were Frank Brady and Aggie Ashton, the former a retired saloon keeper, and the lady the chief attraction in a house of ill-fame on St. Justin street, and Monsieur Jack Laird, widely known to the sports of this city. Miss Nellie Leslie, who keeps another "boarding house" on St. Constant street, was another friend of the defaulter, and amongst them all the dashing young Texan was kept daily and nightly engaged. All at once Brady was noticed by the boys to be the possessor of a beard of wealth, and about the time that Detective Grose took up the case against Walton grave suspicions were entertained as to the honesty of Ashton, Brady, Laird and company. The latter so had to the authorities that Frank Brady was invited, so it was stated at the time, into Judge Dugas' private room. It turns out, however, that Miss Ashton's friend was really placed under arrest, and being squeezed very hard acknowledged the corn and handed over funds to the amount of \$1,700. Detective Grose's mission to St. John, whereby \$7,000 was returned to the company's representative in that city, is too well known to be repeated here. Proceedings were quashed by Judge Palmer, and Walton returned at once to the scene of his extensive theft. It appears that when he began to think over what he had been about during his trip north, Walton remembered that the Brady-Ashton crowd had not merely relieved him of the \$1,700 mentioned above, but had taken possession of a cool \$8,000. Pinkerton's officers took up the case a second time, and once more Mr. Grose was commended for his good many different rumors are afloat as to the manner in which the prosecution has been able to work up the case, it being stated openly on the street that the woman to whom the defaulter had given the \$17,000 had come to Montreal, entered the Ashton residence as a inmate, and will confront the accused with sufficient evidence to send them all to St. Vincent de Paul for a good number of years. Be this as it may, warrants were issued for the arrest of Frank Brady, Aggie Ashton, Jack Laird and Nellie Leslie. The three first are, however, no ordinary people, and, like the Maloney, Johnson and others, before their arrest, spent a month or so at Hot Springs, Arkansas. This morning they were expected back at the Bonaventure depot. Detectives Grose, Carpenter and Campeau were on hand to welcome them back to Canadian soil. In fact the officers were glad to see the excursionists that they would not allow them to go home, but drove the trio down to breakfast at the Central police station. Proceedings of course, were unavailing and bail was refused, when the prisoners were brought before the police magistrate, Messrs. Greenhalgh, Gaurin and Greenhalgh will represent the prosecution, Mr. St. Pierre, Q. C., the defence, and the preliminary investigation will be opened on Monday next. In the meantime the hotel occupied by the accused have been seized, as well as their contents, and affidavits are in charge of the same.

WHERE IS MR. KIMBER?
There appears to be any amount of mystery attending the disappearance of one Thomas Kimber, who came from Exeter, England, on the 11th of this month and put up at the Grand Central Hotel, St. James street, near the Bonaventure station. The young man remained here a little less than a week, when one morning he suddenly disappeared. As the Benwell tragedy up west has been ringing in everybody's ear the Englishman's disappearance excited more than usual interest around the hotel, and amongst those of his friends whom he had met since coming to Canada. Detective Robertson took up the case, and to-day some ugly revelations have been made. Although not previously stated, it appears that when Kimber's bedroom was first searched after the occupant's disappearance a strange discovery was made. The blankets and sheets on the bed in which he had slept were covered with blood, so was the carpet on the floor, and in the corner of the room was found a white-handled razor which was thickly coated with blood. The officer at once took charge of the missing man's belongings and had them brought to headquarters. He seems to have been possessed of two different references to different people in Montreal, while one letter was addressed to "Mr. Brown, of the Halifax gas works." Mr. Styles, the manager of the hotel, is almost certain that he saw Kimber leave the premises the morning the strange discovery was made. Both Chief Detective Cullen and Detective Robertson are working on the case, which promises to be a first-class mystery.

The News in Brief.

There is a deficit in the Italian budget of 35,000,000 lire. Since April fifty-five strikes have broken in Austria. Business failures in Canada this week were 38, against 29 last week. Mr. Michael Davitt is about to start a journal in the interest of labor. The quarrymen in Hollywood, Wales, have struck for an advance of wages. Major Serpa Pinto has been appointed an aide-de-camp to the King of Portugal. There have been thirteen deaths together as a result of the rioting in Biala, Austria. Sir Sidney Waterlow and party have arrived at Niagara Falls on a sight-seeing tour. Emperor William arrived at Darmstadt yesterday and the Empress has started for the same place. Henry M. Stanley and his colleagues visited Antwerp yesterday and were received with great enthusiasm. Thos. Gilmore, a non-union carpenter, was yesterday fatally assaulted by half a dozen strikers in Chicago. The police of Hamburg and Altona, Germany, will prohibit open air demonstrations by the workmen on May 1st. A Zanzibar despatch says the Germans have built a fortified station at Mount Kenia, formally annexing that district. Emin Pasha has left Zanzibar for the interior with 600 porters, five German officers and a large body of Nubian soldiers. Mr. George Augustus Sala has been awarded 25 damages in his suit for libel against Mr. Furniss, the caricaturist, in London. The Grits of Essex Centre have decided to support the candidature of Mr. A. H. Clarke, barrister, in case Mr. Balfour, M.P.E., retires. Sir Francis de Winton will start for Mombassa, in May, to assume the direction of the affairs of the British East Africa Company. Joseph Burkholder, a farmer near Thamesford, Ont., while drawing manure into a field yesterday was killed by his team running away. Ground has been broken at Bluffton, Ala., for the new building of the University of Southland, founded by the Northern Methodist church.
