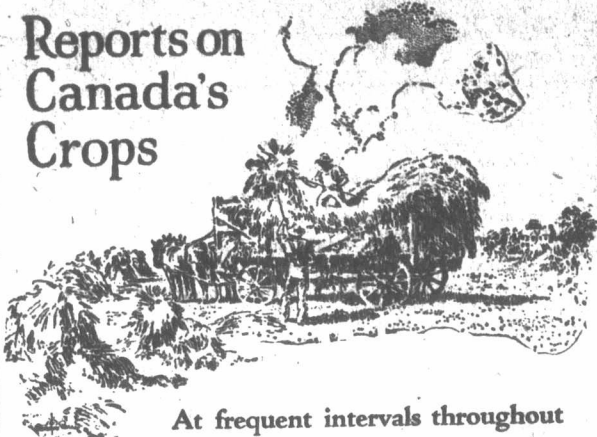


Reports on Canada's Crops
