

NEW MILL.—The enterprising firm

of Messrs. Grey & Wheaton, at

Sackville, N. B., have recently com-

pleted the erection of their new

mill on the site of the one destroyed

by fire in March last. The present

structure is very spacious, is 100

feet in length, 40 feet in breadth,

three stories in height. It ex-

tends a single machine which will

run from 16,000 to 20,000 shingles per

smoothly. Good stock pine shingles

can be purchased at the mill for

\$1.80 per thousand. Driven by the

same steam power as a wheat mill,

and, as a saw mill for cutting lumber

of any dimension. The cost of

the building, engine, machinery, &c.,

will exceed \$9,000. So much for in-

terest.
