NEWS IN BRIEF

Mr. James Hall, of Campbellford, died of heart failure.

Pickering College was destroyed by fire. Loss, \$50,000.

Thomas Eyles, a baker, was found dead in bed at Stratford.

Lord Strathcona arrived at Montreal on New Year's day, from England.

The new Knox Church and Sabbath School, Toronto, is to cost \$170,000.

Seven new Toronto fire captains have been appointed by Chief Thompson.

Toronto customs returns for the year were \$9,233,095, as against \$9,118,691 in 1904.

The Lake Superior Corporation, with a capital of \$5,000,000, has received an Ontario charter.

Four business houses in Truro, Nova Scotia, suffered a combined loss of \$31,000 by fire.

James Burke was murdered at Ottawa while attempting to force his way into a drinking dive.

The value of Toronto building permits for the year totalled \$10,347,910, compared with \$5,896,120 in 1904.

Five young clerks arrived from Scotland on the Allan Line steamer, to work in the Bank of Commerce.

The United Irish League of Great Britain has issued a manifesto denouncing the Unionists and Royalists.

The council of St. Petersburg workmen have called off the strikes in favor of an armed uprising in the near future.

The will of the late Samuel Flint, of Brockville, which disposes of an estate of \$80,000, has been filed for probate.

The Japanese Financial Commissioner Takahashi declares that Japan intends to develop Corea, but not as a vassalage.

Mayor Urquhart has asked Toronto citizens to start a fund for the new General Hospital by subscribing \$100 each.

Max Cohen was arrested on a charge of bigamy at Toronto, and a warrant is out for the arrest of his alleged second wife.

Lady Pellatt, of Toronto, was presented with a silver punch bowl by the officers and ex-officers of the Queen's Own Rifles.

There are persistent rumors in St. Petersburg that Count Witte will be asked to resign in favor of the Minister of the Interior.

William Jagoe, aged nineteen, of St. Thomas, was crushed to death in coupling cars on the Michigan Central at Niagara Falls.

At the Governor-General's levee at Ottawa, on January 1, the C. M. G. insignia was conferred on the recent recipients of the honor.

Messrs. Torrey and Alexander opened their evangelistic meetings at Massey Hall, Toronto, before audiences numbering many thousands.

The Duke of Devonshire declares stoutly against Balfour's final scheme, and is confident that the Government will not frame a home rule bill.

Edward Passmore, who was in a collision with an express wagon, and John Bell, who was struck by a street car, in Toronto, died of their injuries.

As all the municipal and school elections went by acclamation in Belleville, the license commissioner has decided that the bar-rooms need not close Jan. 1.

Two imperial commissioners from China are on their way to the United States to study American political, educational, military and industrial methods.

President Jordan, of Leland Stanford University, has announced that recent discoveries in connection with the death of Mrs. Stanford will soon be made public.

Walter Wellman has been commissioned by the Chicago Record-Herald to find the north pole in an air ship, which Santos Dumont, of Paris, will construct and navigate.

The farmers of Cumberland and Westmoreland, England, after a lengthy discussion, have decided that the Chamberlain proposals are not in the interests of agriculture.

Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain has issued his election manifesto in which he avows his fiscal policy and attacks

the Liberals as a "Home Rule Little England Government."

The jury in the case of Manning C. Palmer, charged with misappropriating funds of the American Exchange National Bank of Syracuse, returned a verdict of guilty. Palmer was sentenced to five years in Alcatraz prison.

Lord Rosslyn's trunk was seized at the Windsor Hotel, Montreal, on Saturday night at the instance of Mr. Small, theatrical manager, Toronto, who seeks to satisfy a claim for \$400 for alleged non-fulfillment of contract.

A great wave, reaching almost tidal proportions, rolled up Vineyard Sound, Mass., on Saturday night, and, overtaking the big five-masted schooner Henry O. Barrett, tumbled over the stern and swept aboard to their death Captain Joshua Norton, of Rockland, Me., the commander of the vessel, and his mate, James Conley, of St. John, N. B.

Although the building in which they were confined was burning down over their heads, many of the patients in Cottage No. 2 at Mimico Asylum, which was destroyed by fire on Sunday morning, absolutely refused to be removed. The twenty or more patients in the house were, however, safely carried out.

PRINTERS' STRIKE.

TYPOS WILL STAND OUT FOR EIGHT-HOUR DAY.

New York, Jan. 1.—For the first time since the organization of the International Typographical Union a general strike will go into effect to-morrow in every shop in the United States and Canada where the employer refuses to grant an eight-hour working day. Several times before the union printers in various parts of the country have ordered strikes to enforce a betterment of their condition, but in many cases have been won by the employers.

Now, with a treasury fund of more than a quarter of a million dollars, obtained by assessment on every union printer, a determined effort is to be made to establish the eight-hour day universally. Out of the 6,000 members of the Typographical Union No. 6, in New York, it was estimated that fewer than 900 would be obliged to strike to-morrow.

Union officials said to-night that many New York firms had agreed to the eight-hour day.

Philadelphia, Jan. 1.—Twenty-four of the one hundred printing firms in this city have signed the agreement giving their employees an eight-hour work day. These firms, however, are not members of the Typothetae, the master printers' organization. The firms belonging to the Typothetae refuse to recognize the shorter work day.

Thousands of Children in Montreal Give Alliance.

Montreal, Jan. 1.—St. James' Methodist Church was the scene of a memorable gathering to-day, when 5,000 Sunday school children, belonging to the various Presbyterian, Methodist, Congregational and Baptist Churches in the city assembled for New Year service. A thrilling scene was presented when the Union Jack was unfurled, and 5,000 voices repeated the words: "I promise to be loyal and true to the Union Jack and to the Empire which it represents."

A cable conveying New Year's greetings was sent to King Edward.

LOCAL OPTION'S CLEAN SWEEP.

Results of the Vote Where Submitted Yesterday.

The Rural Municipalities Were Strong in Support.

The By-law Beaten in the Township of Barton.

Owen Sound, Jan. 1.—No political election has caused more intense interest than the contest on the question of local option in Owen Sound to-day. The contest was hard fought, and was intensified along the lines suggested by the organ of the liquor interests, and put up a municipal ticket opposed to local option. The ticket included some of the best known citizens and largest taxpayers, but the flood tide of local option has swept the slate clean, though it included two ex-Mayors and other former representatives. Mayor-elect Joyce's majority will exceed 150 over his opponent, Mr. S. Lloyd, one of the most popular citizens.

The vote on the local option by-law was 1238 in favor and 762 against. The vote on the by-law to loan the Keenan Woodware Manufacturing Company \$25,000, was carried by a majority of 1291 to 184, while the vote to annex the town plot of Brooke to Owen Sound was 810 to 363. In the township of Sarawak and the town plot of Brooke the vote was overwhelmingly against annexation.
