An examination of the records Anybody owing the Blackville shows that 8 of the 18 cows gave less than 5000 pounds of milk, and of these two gave less than 4000 pounds and one less than 3000 pounds. Taking 5000 pounds as a fair standard of milk production 44.5 per cent of the group would have had to be culled three equal bimonthly instalments. out. The ten remaining cows gave an average yearly production of 6276.8 pounds of milk testing 3.6 per profit over feed was \$34.18 or \$314.80 cows gave within \$72.56 as much profit as the eighteen. In other words if the 8 poor cows had been culled out \$417.74 worth of food would have been saved. Forms Ready In Few Days For Income Tax

The Dominion income tax return forms, T1, T1A, an dT2, which, under the act, must be used in filing indiv panies' earnings respectively for the 1920 period are not yet available for distribution and those who have already handed in to the inspector of taxation returns in any of these clas ses on 1919 forms have submitted in correct returns according to the amendments made to the act in 1920.

Under the amendment to the act any one who does comply with the regulation which obliges those filing returns this year to compute their assessments and accompany them with an amount equal to one quarter of the tax in each case is liable to a

The new forms which must by an ployed this year will no. le giveout until pamphlets of income tax in formation and instructions directing any of these three classes should be made are received. When they do arrive both the forms and the explanatory pamphlets will be available from postmasters. It is expected both would be in hands of the postmasters within a few days.

Under the amendment, those filing returns under any of the three clas ses named must accompany their returns with a check covering 25 per cent of the amount of the tax or surtax, the balance, if any to be paid in
