PURSE-SEINE PROHIBITION.

Premier Morris is due in the city this evening and will no doubt promptly lay before the Executive Council the terms demanded by the United States to abandon the reference to the Fishery Expert Commission at the Hague of the fishery regulations in dispute.

We can hardly credit that America has made the astounding request for free bait, but in view of Capt. Corkum's request for permission to buy herring in Placentia Bay, it is by no means improbable.

To such a demand there can be only one reply, and that is a negative one. For free bait there must be given a free entry in America for Newfoundland.

It is more probable that America asks for the repeal of the prohibition of the use of the purse seine. This has long been the attitude of the American State Department, and was set forth in a letter addressed by Congressman Gardner to the Gloucester Board of Trade on July 7, 1906.

So detrimental to the fishery has Newfoundland regarded this mode of fishing that it is prohibited throughout our waters—treaty waters or not. It cannot therefore be regarded other than a bona fide regulation for the preservation of the fishery, which is not meant to discriminate against American fishermen in favour of local fishermen. In general terms, the Hague Tribunal laid down, in the Award the principle that such a regulation was not in conflict with the Convention of 1818 and that Newfoundland was competent to make it.

Better let America go to the Hague than give way on this matter. Better still, wait and see if Canada fails in the reciprocity negotiations; and if she does, let these questions be merged in the general and larger question of Free Bait for Free Entry and a general Reciprocity scheme.

A Public Dispensary.

Editor Evening Telegram.

"Dear Sir,—Now that the matter of a clean and healthy city is the topic of the day, I think a suggestion would be in order. If the Government and City Council would meet and have a chat over the idea, they would be doing a public benefit.

I wish to suggest that a public Dispensary with a doctor in attendance be opened in each end of the city, the doctor having stated hours each day when any person could call and have his or her sickness attended to. This might be the means of preventing an epidemic.

Take the present spreading of typhus fever. If the public Dispensary was in the city, people when they felt unwell could visit the doctor at the Dispensary and have their sickness in the early stages attended to. The doctor would certainly send them to the Hospital at once, and to-day you wouldn't have this disease spreading.

In other cities a Dispensary is worked to advantage, and men, women and children go and have their illnesses attended to at once. It could be worked in St. John's with the same success.

At present many a sick person thinks twice of going to the doctor, as he can ill afford to pay. In case of a contagious disease, prompt action would protect the public. Under the present rules and regulations if a poor person needs the district doctor he has to lose his day to go through the ordinary red tape, and perhaps the patient may be dead before the doctor arrives, and no fault of the doctor.
