At a special meeting of the City Council held last night, Councillor Mullaly's motion to have the franchise in civic matters extended to all men of 21 years of age on payment of one dollar poll tax, was defeated. He gave notice of motion that he would bring up the matter in an adjourned session. The Council then held a consultation with the Solicitor on the subject of proposed legislation in connection with the city. The meeting adjourned at 11 o'clock.

A REQUEST TO SEAMEN.

The following telegram was received last night by the Premier, St. John's: "The schooner Cardina, whose arrival at Halifax from Harbor Breton, after a stormy passage of 18 days, was reported in to-day's News:—'I passed a schooner, bottom-up, 45 miles west from the Sable Island. This schooner was about 90 tons. I was running west with a heavy sea, and it was blowing a storm. Apparently there was no crew on board. The schooner was on her beam ends. Report to the papers for information of all seamen going that way.' (Sgd.) WILLIAM CARROLL, Master Schr. Cardina."

Late Cable News.

CHANCES OF RECIPROCITY BILL.

WASHINGTON, This Morning. The McCall bill, carrying into effect the Reciprocity Agreement reached between the House yesterday and the Senate, was passed by that body. A test vote came soon after the House was called to order. McCall moved immediate consideration of the bill. So this objection was taken. When voting began it soon became apparent that lines were being tightly drawn between those favoring and those opposing the Canadian Agreement. The vote to take up the bill was 197 to 120. It is expected that the bill will be passed by an even larger majority. 101 Republicans voted against immediate consideration; 63 Republicans voted for it. It is announced that both the regulars and insurgents are split.

DISTRESS SIGNALS FLYING.

Special Evening Telegram. HALIFAX, This Morning. The Government steamer Montserrat, bound for Plint Island yesterday, was unable to effect a landing on account of heavy ice which completely blocked Cabot Strait. The Stanley is fast in the ice off Low Point. When clear she will attempt to reach Plint Island to find the cause of the distress signals flying there for several days.

Schooner Checkers Eventful Voyage.

FLOODS AND SEAS ALMOST SUBMERGE SHIP.

The schr. Checkers, Capt. Pienan Rumsey, arrived here from Oporto yesterday afternoon after a most eventful and very stormy voyage. Interviewed by the Telegram, Captain Rumsey said that the ship left Burin on September 1st, last, with laden for Oporto, and made the run across in the good time of 16 days. In about 19 days she was ready to leave for the port, and was at anchor in the stream when, owing to incessant rains and heavy storms the River Duoro became so swollen that heavy floods resembling those of the previous year when the Ceylon came to grief, were experienced, and the Harbor Master warned the crews of all steamers and vessels to leave them and go ashore for safety. Besides vessels there were in the port 25 steamers, some of which went ashore. The river overflowed its banks and much damage was wrought ashore as well as on the water. Daily houses could be seen floating down the river, broken boats and barges passed swiftly by, badly broken, and bodies of several who were drowned were also swept down in the flood. The current ran at a speed of 17 knots. The Newfoundland vessels lying at Oporto with the Checkers were the Annie Lauder, of Burgeo; the Deputy Louise, of St. John's; Minnie Pearl, Burin; and two English vessels—the Reliance, which was loaded by Crosbie & Co., and another. All these vessels sustained more or less damage.

Capt. Rumsey and his men remained 7 days ashore in a hotel while the floods continued. The Checkers lost her starboard and stream anchors, ropes and gear, and the life boat was swept from her side. The tow boat Mars collided with her and carried away the bowsprit and topmasts, and she had her funnel knocked out of her and was stove by the force of the collision.

Repairs being affected the vessel left on the 2nd January in company with the Clefentine, and had fine weather until the Gulf Stream was reached, when on the 7th inst. she experienced a hurricane of wind from the N. N. W., which lasted for 7 days, and the vessel had to lay to for that period. A monstrous sea ran, and to help allay it in some measure oil bags had to be used and were thrown over the bows, and drags had to be put out to keep her head up to the sea which was and again threatened to swamp the ship. On the 2nd inst. one comber boarded her and carried away the galley, life boat, foreboom, forecastle and a portion of the starboard bulwarks.
