Funny Little Welsh Town Where  
Sexes Have Changed Places  
There is in Pembrokehire, Wales,  
a little town called Llangwm, which  
were it not for an exceedingly strange  
custom, would never in the wide  
world attract any more attention than  
any other community of little stone  
cottages and old world fishermen.  
Llangwm and in all the town mere  
man no longer holds sway as head  
of the household, nor is he compelled  
to care his own living.  
If a likely youth and if arrived at  
an age—not necessarily of discretion  
—and size that enable him to make  
himself useful about the house in  
cooking, washing, cleaning, bed mak-  
ing, such embarrassing duties as  
"asking ma and pa" and those inci-  
dents peculiar to courtship in other  
localities are quite unnecessary at  
Llangwm. The marriage ceremony is  
of the simplest character, and no such  
thing as a honeymoon is allowed.  
The youth settles himself down to his  
life job and is happy so long as he  
does not become entangled with the  
heads of the other households.  
The Llangwm maiden is an expert  
fisherwoman. She rises early and  
braves all weathers. She not only  
catches her fish but sells it in the  
neighboring towns. She is usually  
stronger than the average champion  
oarsman and can row with almost  
much skill.

changed, and the bargain is complet-

In religious matters the Llangwm-  
ians are extremely straitlaced. Dan-  
cing, card playing, novel reading are  
absolutely barred. No intoxicating  
liquors can be obtained in the place  
and for years inhabitants have re-  
volved against the opening of an inn.  
In the house conversation is not al-  
lowed during meals, and although  
newspapers are sometimes brought in  
they are hidden away from Saturday  
night until Monday morning. The  
villagers look askance at all stran-  
gers picking their way along the nar-  
row street and stigmatize them as  
foreigners.

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**German Chancellor  
on Moroccan Crisis**

BERLIN, To-day.  
The galleries of the Reichstag were  
crowded when the Chancellor rose to  
speak yesterday afternoon. He began  
by taking up the reports to the effect  
that the despatch of the German gun-  
boat, Panther, to Agadir, in Morocco,  
was a "bolt out of the blue sky," and  
that Germany planned to acquire ter-  
ritory in Southern Morocco. Before  
sending a warship to Agadir, the  
Chancellor said he had proposed to  
France that Germany should open  
negotiations for the purpose of reach-  
ing a basis for the recognition of  
France's political position in Morocco  
and an economic guarantee to be ob-  
tained by Germany and colonial com-  
pensation. France, however, avoided  
the positive proposal, in the meantime  
going ahead with the occupation of  
Morocco. The despatch of the gunboat  
was necessary and produced the desired  
result. Referring to the speech of  
Lord George at the Banquet of Lon-  
don Bankers, July 21st, the Chan-  
celor declared: "Nobody can tell when  
war some time will come, but my  
duty is to act so that war avoidable  
and not denominated by the honor of  
Germany should be avoided. The  
Franco-German crisis, the Chancellor  
said, was so acute that the approach-  
ing final settlement and the peaceful  
ending were worth more than all the  
discussions on Arbitration and Disar-  
mament.

**Premier Asquith  
at the Guildhall.**

LONDON, To-day.  
Premier Asquith at the Guild Hall  
Banquet, last night, referred to Bal-  
four as the "most distinguished mem-  
ber of the greatest deliberative as-  
sembly in the world." He also refer-  
red to the Coronation and the Imper-  
ial Conferences. He characterized  
some features of the struggle between  
Labor and Capital as barbarous. As  
to the struggle in China he apprehend-  
ed no immediate danger to foreigners  
and British subjects. We have no  
disposition to interfere. We wish her  
a peaceful and progressive future. As  
to the war between Italy and Turkey,  
the British policy was one of strict  
neutrality. The Premier also express-  
ed profound satisfaction at the peace-  
ful outcome of the conversations be-  
tween France and Germany as to Mo-  
rocco.

of the friends of the contracting par-  
ties being present.

Punctually at the appointed time,  
the bride dressed in a charming gown  
of cream duchesse lace, hand-  
broided, was conducted into the

**ST. JOHN'S  
MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.**  
The following is published for the  
information of the public:—  
St. John's Municipal Act, 1902.

Section 26. No person shall build  
or erect in any place in the town of  
St. John's, whether on the site of a  
former building or not, any house,  
stable or other building, unless he  
shall have first submitted a plan of  
such house, stable or other building,  
to the Council, and such plan shall  
have been approved-of, and consent  
to the erection of such house, stable or  
other building shall have been given  
by the Council; and any house,  
stable or other building erected with-  
out such plan having been submitted  
and approved-of, and consent given  
as aforesaid, and any house erected  
otherwise than in accordance with the  
plan so submitted and approved of as  
aforesaid, shall be a public nuisance,  
and the like proceedings shall be had  
in respect of the same as are provided  
with respect to other public nuisances.  
Provided that the Council may,  
whenever they may think fit, decline  
to approve of any plan submitted to  
them, and may refuse their consent  
to the erection of any house, stable  
or other building, unless and until  
they shall be satisfied that the lines  
of such house, stable or other build-  
ing, entirely coincide with the lines  
of street upon which the said house,  
stable or other building, may front or  
abut, that such house, stable or other  
building will not from any cause  
whenever be a source of danger to  
the neighbouring houses or buildings,  
that such house, stable or other build-  
ing, will not be prejudicial to the  
health of the inhabitants of the town  
or any of them, and also that the  
style and manner of construction of  
such house, stable or other building,  
shall conform therewith as to the  
other buildings either erected or  
about to be erected on the same  
street.  
NOTE: If there are any breaches  
of the foregoing after the publishing  
of this notice the penalty will be put  
in force.
