LONDON, Aug. 16. Prince Arthur of Connaught will represent King George at the funeral of the late Emperor of Japan. He will be accompanied by Lord Methuen and Admiral Poel.

LIVERPOOL, Aug. 16. Capt. Lord of the S. S. Californian, has issued a statement defending his conduct at the time of the Titanic disaster. The evidence, he declares, is conclusive, that no one of the responsible officers of the Californian were aware that there had been any serious calamity.

NEW YORK, Aug. 16. F. E. Smith, the prominent Unionist M. P., arrived by the Mauretania. He declared that the Liberal Government of England was going to pieces fast, and would be shattered completely before the Home Rule Bill was again brought before Parliament. He asserted that Tariff Reform was sweeping England.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16. The Conference report on the Panama Canal Bill, containing provisions against trust-owned ships and granting free tolls to certain American vessels was adopted by the Senate to-day by 48 to 18, after a futile fight against it led by Senator Brandegee, Chairman of the Panama Canal Commission.

DUBLIN, Aug. 16. The Irish Master of the Rolls has delivered judgment in the Hendricks infants case, five children of a mixed marriage. The father, who is dead, was a Catholic, the mother, who is living, being a Protestant. It was al-

leged that the children had been brought up in accordance with the father's wish as Roman Catholics, but that recently, owing to the influence of the mother and other persons, they had embraced Protestantism. In the case of the two eldest girls who expressed their determination to become Protestants, His Lordship made no order. The three younger boys, he directed, should be brought up as Catholics.

The weekly session of the Municipal Council was held yesterday afternoon.

James Brennan applied for street line on Scott Street; granted.

J. C. Hepburn, Sec-Treas. Presbyterian Church, wrote that enough water could not be had at Presbyterian Hall; referred to Engineer.

H. G. Thomas asked information re washing machine; referred to Engineer.

Geo. Peters, R. Greene and A. Geo. applied for permission to make repairs and alterations; referred to Engineer.

Several applications for positions were received and filed.

Permission was given J. Reid to repair house on Dicks' Square.

Council's attention was drawn to condition of drain on Cabot Street; Engineer will visit it and make report.

Tenders were received for the plumbing of houses under the "Small House Sewerage Act." Mr. W. Willis' tender being the lowest was accepted.

Plan of house submitted by A. Kennedy was approved of.

Plan of alteration of house submitted by Greene and Jackson was approved of.

Plans for H. J. Stabb & Co.'s concrete chimney, and brick front for D. Galway's store were approved of.

Mr. A. Rice asked compensation on account of damages in recent rain storm; claim for \$30 was declined. Council contended they were not liable.

A communication was read from Bowring Bros. with reference to retaining wall near their South Side premises which is liable to collapse. Council will write the firm telling them they are not responsible.

After the passing of bills, etc., the meeting adjourned.

THE REGATTA.

Our annual regatta took place on Wednesday and Thursday, and was enjoyed by all notwithstanding the rather disagreeable weather.

Wednesday morning opened fine and a large number of citizens and visitors were on the scene at the time appointed for a start. In the first race—Trademen—five boats contested, but the Maggie came in first, with Bessie, second and Winkle, third. Time, 15.54. The second item on the programme was the Labourers' which was keenly contested, resulting in the Bessie passing the winning point first. Time, 14.44. After this race the day proved too wet and disagreeable to continue, so the committee wisely decided to postpone the other events until Thursday.

Thursday morning opened finer but still so doubtful as to cause many who would have liked to be present deciding to remain at home.

The first race called was the Society race for the Garland Cup. This race was won in 16.19 by the following crew in the Orange boat Bessie—J. Sheppard, cox.; A. Warren, L. Sheppard, R. Alcock, W. G. Yetman.

The K. E. Brigade won the Brigade Race. Time, 17.54. They rowed the Maggie and C. Pike proved himself a good coxswain. This same crew won the Juvenile race, C. Ash, cox. Time, 16.27.

The All-comers contest was very much admired and showed signs of true sport that were the praise of all present. As the gun fired three boats made the start. Two got away in good style, but two oars were broken in the Winkle as the stroke was put on. The Maggie was manned by Lunenburg bankers and the Bessie by a stalwart crew from Bristol's Hope. The men saw the mishap and returned to the buoy until the Winkle's crew were supplied with new oars. The Bristol's Hope boys won in the Bessie in 14.24.

The Archibald Cup Race was to be contested by four crews, viz. Carbon-car, Bristol's Hope, Bell Island and Harbor Grace. The Maggie and Bessie being considered evenly matched boats it was decided to row the race on time, and Harbor Grace and Bell Island took the first spin. The Bell Island crew coming in first in the Bessie in 15.14½. The Carbon-car crew and that of Bristol's Hope now took their places in the boats and were about to start when some person's keen eye noticed a Freshwater man in the Carbon-car boat, and as the rule specified that the crew in each case should be from one town, the committee found themselves much against their wish compelled to request the coxswain to get a Carbon-car man to take the place of the Freshwater man. Carbon-car men then decided not to row, and the Bristol's Hope boys were forced to row alone, and endeavour to beat the Bell Island time. This they did and brought their boat the Bessie past the winning post in 14.46½. They are now the holders of the cup for the year, and won medals for the quickest time. We offer them our congratulations.

The day was very much enjoyed. The tents were well patronized, good feeling prevailed throughout, and we feel it our duty to thank the committee for its untiring efforts to have all the arrangements made so perfectly that no hitch occurred.

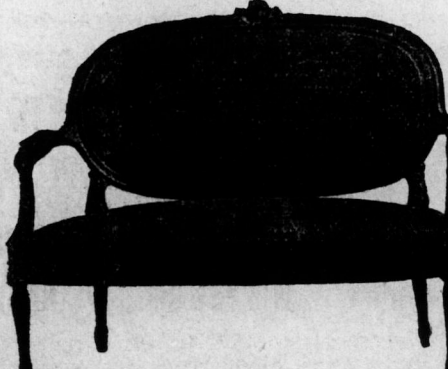
