NEW BONAVENTURE, To-day.

A great meeting was held in New Bonaventure last night and lasted from 7.30 to 11.30; the enthusiasm was remarkable; Coaker Lloyd and Stone had great reception. The sentiment is overwhelmingly in favour of coalition under Bond. The meeting embraced people from British Harbour, Kirley's Harbour, Old Bonaventure, Spaniard's Bay and Trouty. There are only two or three opponents in all these places. Received usual reception of guns, cheering and display of bunting. Never saw anything like it. Trinity Bay from British Harbour to Elliston is solid for Bond and Coaker.

BRITISH HARBOR, To-day.

The Bond-Coaker candidates were received right royally at British Harbour. Practically every flag in the harbor was hoisted in honor of the visit of Coaker, Lloyd and Stone. Hundreds of volleys were fired and the hall was crowded about 200 from the settlement and numbers from schooners and the neighboring settlements. The audience was most enthusiastic. Coaker spoke for an hour and a half and was so much applauded that he asked for it to cease. He strongly advocated coalition under Bond, to whom he paid a high tribute. Lloyd spoke strongly in favor of coalition with the Union and against the grabbing of Government members and supporters. He was well received and loudly applauded. Mr. Stone made a brilliant speech in favor of coalition and against the Government. The meeting was unanimous in supporting the candidature of Lloyd, Stone and Targett. British Harbour was not one whit behind any other place in support of the united Opposition. They built a fine arch in honor of President Coaker's visit and among the mottoes displayed were Success to the United Party, and Vote for Lloyd, Stone and Targett on the arch, was Welcome to President Coaker, the man we delight to Honor. WASHINGTON, To-day.

Democrat's Tariff Revision Bill was advanced to its last Congressional stage yesterday when it was brought back to House from Joint Conference Committee with unanimous endorsement of Democratic conferees. Leaders both Houses Congress confident, last night, Bill practically complete, now would be signed by President Wilson before the end of this week. President Wilson satisfied that Tariff Bill out of the way Congress will take up currency question and is prepared to dispose of it before adjournment. Tariff conference report went to House soon after that body convened at noon. House will take up Tariff Bill to-day. It is believed it will be passed before adjournment and is expected to reach Senate on Wednesday, and pass that body by Thursday. Cotton features tax is still in dispute, the House refusing to accept the so-called Clarke amendment adopted by Senate. Expressions from White House from Congressional leaders, however, indicated in final conference over this feature that the whole plan might be dropped from Tariff Bill and taken up as a separate measure next winter.

NEGRAS, Mexico, To-day.

More than four hundred Federal and rebel dead left on field below Barroteran, where a fierce struggle took place between two forces on Saturday and Sunday, according to reports brought to Constitutionalists headquarters. Both sides compelled to withdraw from lack of water and ammunition. Constitutionalists falling back on Sabinas, where they dynamited a great railway bridge across the Sabinas River to prevent another attack from Federals under General Maas. Eye witnesses say desperate hand to hand fighting occurred after exhaustion of revolutionists ammunition and that the Federal troops at one time were on the point of fleeing from the field when they were rallied by their officers. The dead were piled high where these conflicts took place. Both sides agreed on an armistice late Sunday to care for wounded. Despatches indicate the Federals will resume march on Sabinas after short rest at Aura. Confirmation of the destruction of all mining towns in the path of the retreating Constitutionalists was received.

CALCUTTA, To-day.

The head constable of Calcutta was shot dead by three Bengal youths, who occupied through dense crowd. The crime is supposed to have a political motive.
