**Tag Day.**

To-day is Tag Day, and a band of ladies were out bright and early to tag with appropriate emblems all who contribute to the Red Cross Fund. The ladies are attired in the white costumes of a hospital nurse bearing the hospital red cross. As this mode of collecting funds affords a means by which all young and old, wealthy and poor, can contribute something, we have no doubt that a goodly sum will be collected by the ladies to-day. This morning Mr. P. H. Steer, the Treasurer of the Red Cross Fund, acknowledges the receipt of \$7,733 up to last night. With to-day's collections, and the efforts of to-morrow, we have no doubt that the amount of Ten Thousand Dollars, which is the sum aimed at will be considerably exceeded. To-morrow is Empire Day a most suitable time to bring to a culmination this effort on behalf of those who are wounded or fall sick while fighting for the Empire. To-morrow the Scouts hold their sports on St. George's Field, and a committee of ladies will serve refreshments there and devote the proceeds of the sales to the Red Cross Fund. At night the play "Milestones" will be staged in the Casino. There are for the benefit of the same Fund. Our leading amateur actors and actresses are taking part in the performance and quite apart from the commendable object of the Fund, the drama and the players will afford a good night's entertainment. With the collections already in hand and the money taken to gather in more to-day and to-morrow, and with everybody doing what they can, we have no doubt we shall be able to announce on Thursday that a good round sum has been added to the Red Cross Fund.

**Private Green Addresses Epworth League**

AT GOWER STREET. Last evening the members and friends of Gower Street Epworth League were given a splendid address by Private Gordon Green who related his experiences since leaving here with A. Co., October, 1914. In a manner most descriptive, he outlined the various places he had visited since leaving old Newfoundland. He took his audience across the briny deep to Salisbury Plain, Ayr, Edinburgh, Stob's Camp, Aldershot, on board ship to Alexandria and Cairo and further on to the front line of trenches on the Gallipoli Peninsula. He spoke highly of the manner in which "Ours" compared with other regiments when in battle. The work of Lieut. Donnelly and his men at Caribou Hill was worthy of the honours bestowed upon them, in which their country so proudly shared. Private Green was out in that terrible storm that assailed such havoc among the men. The meeting was presided over by Mr. W. G. Currie and was of a patriotic nature. Mr. W. H. Peters sang "Keep the Old Flag Flying," while Private Green rendered a duet: "Keep the Home Fires Burning." The music was supplied by Corporal Nosworthy and Pte. LeMessurier. At the close a vote of thanks to the soldier speaker was proposed by Mr. Geo. Peters and seconded by Rev. Dr. Fenwick. Private Green is still suffering from the effects of exposure.



The nominated officers were as follows: President, Sir Edward Morris; Vice-Presidents, Hon. P. T. McGrath and Mr. J. A. Clift; Secretary, Mr. W. R. Warren; members of Executive Committee: Hon. George Knowling, Hon. R. K. Bishop, Hon. J. J. Murphy, J. C. Crosbie, Mr. Devereaux, Mr. Lloyd. The two members nominated as delegates to visit the Old Land were Hon. R. K. Bishop and Mr. J. A. Clift. Messrs. McGrath, Clift and Warren were appointed to draft a constitution. The Committee will report to a meeting of members next Monday night.

**Amanda Howell Passed Away at Hospital**

After a prolonged period of illness and suffering, she passed away at Hospital yesterday Amanda Howell. She was twenty years of age, just blossoming into womanhood. Deceased belonged to Bonne Bay. It will be remembered, and the historic event is still fresh in the minds of not a few, of the terrible ordeal she went through five years ago when she lost her way in the forest while journeying from her home in Bonne Bay to Rocky Harbor. She was found by a search party almost naked, after having been exposed for twelve days to the bleak winds of October, 1911. The awful exposure and suffering that this poor little girl—she was only 15 years old at the time—can scarcely be imagined. The victim entered the General Hospital here and had both legs amputated, that course being deemed necessary to save her life. Subsequently she contracted tuberculosis and was obliged to enter St. George's Hospital, Signal Hill, for treatment. Mrs. Winslow, the Matron, proved a kind and warm-hearted friend to Miss Howell, as when the latter was on the mending hand and preparing to go home Matron Winslow, who was on her vacation, accompanied Amanda to Bonne Bay on the S.S. Portia. Unfortunately, however, that dread disease, consumption, had gained such a hold that cure was impossible. Last fall she re-entered the Hospital, and gradually but surely she declined and the end came yesterday morning.

Mr. W. M. Clapp, member for the District of Bonne Bay, has had the body embalmed, and is forwarding it to the late home of the deceased for interment. To the sorrowing parents and other relatives and friends of the deceased young woman general and sincere sympathy will be expressed and in which the Telegram deeply joins.
