

HEAVY AIR LOSSES.

PARIS, Dec. 23.

Announcement of progress in the campaign, issued by the war office to-night reads: Between the Oise and the Aisne, patrols were quite active.

Near Juvincourt the Germans attempted a raid on our small positions.


They were repulsed with considerable osses. Other enemy attempts in the sector of Godat north of Courcy and north of Bezonvaux, gave no other results than to leave prisoners in our hands. The night was calm elsewhere. In the period of December 11th to 20th inclusive, fourteen German airplanes were brought down by our pilots; three others were forced to land in a damaged condition inside their own lines. In addition, three enemy machines were brought down by the fire of our special guns.


