GRAND FALLS DELEGATES. Magistrate Scott of Grand Falls, leaves the city for Carbonear this evening representing with Mr. M. Pike, J.P., of the Customs, the circuit of Grand Falls and vicinity at the Methodist Conference. The Twillingate district meeting, which was planned for Long Island, N.D.B., had to be cancelled owing to ice conditions; and a short session was held at Lewisporte by such clergymen as could reach that central railway town. The district work will be finalized at the Conference town.

A Wedding in the Air. With the exhausts from two twelve-cylinder Liberty motors beating the wedding march, Lieut. R. W. Meade, of Cincinnati, Ohio, and Miss Marjorie Dumont, of Yorkville, Ind., on May 31 were pronounced man and wife, more than 2,000 above the heads of 10,000 spectators at Ellington Field, Texas. A giant Handley-Page bombing plane carried the wedding party of twelve persons. Lieut. E. W. Kilgore piloted the machine, and Chaplain Lieut. J. E. Rees, of Nevan, Ohio, acted as "skypilot." Following the ceremony, the party enjoyed a twenty-five minute cruise.

DR. VALERA IN AMERICA. NEW YORK, June 23. Edward De Valera, President of the Sinn Fein, emerged dramatically to-night from the seclusion in which he has kept himself since his arrival in the United States, and in a statement to the press at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel, where he was greeted by wildly enthusiastic followers, he declared he had come to America to speak for the Irish nation. Mr. De Valera declined to tell how he came to reach America, but said he came here from Boston several days ago. It was stated that during his stay in New York he has been living at a Carmelite priory. In a statement to newspaper men, De Valera discussed Irish unanimity for freedom, and the depopulation of Ireland. He drew a parallel between the American revolution and the present effort of Ireland and finished by appealing for aid of Americans for Ireland.

Rumoured Peace Signed. At six o'clock yesterday afternoon a rumour that H. M. S. Cumberland, then in port, had received word that the Peace Terms had been agreed to and signed, gained currency, and for a while everybody was discussing the matter. It was later, however, ascertained that the rumour was unfounded.

Coming to Placentia. The S. S. Glencoe, which leaves North Sydney to-night, will come right on to Placentia, where the passengers will be landed. President H. D. Reid, of the Reid Nfld. Co., and wife are passengers by the Glencoe. Mr. Reid's daughter is very ill in town and he is hurrying home with all speed.
