**TRINITY**

**THE GOVERNOR AND LADY ALLARDYCE IN YE OLD TOWN OF TRINITY.**

"Variety is the spice of life." Following upon the visit of the politician, the commercial men, and the Bishop of Newfoundland, has come that of the Governor and Lady Allardyce. We had the usual week's notice of the official visit of the viceroyal party, and that week was fully occupied by public meetings, the formation and work of committees, a general cleaning up of the town, and the erection of a triumphal arch, etc. Interest in the work was thus awakened, on the part of the men, and that interest increased from day to day. Everybody worked with a will, and by 12 o'clock on the day of the Governor's arrival, all were pleased with the festive appearance of the old town, and each was glad to know that he had worked so hard, and he was satisfied with the results. A general holiday was agreed upon. At the same time the ladies' committee was formed and the decoration of the Parish Hall; and when their work was done, it was well done, and we had no doubt about the pleasure that the appearance of the Hall would give to the Governor and Lady Allardyce.

The day was beautifully fine. There was not a movement of the water even at the Narrows; the surface of the harbour was drummed by the slightest breeze; whilst the atmosphere was delightful. In short, it was an ideal day, and we were glad. As H.M.S. Wistaria passed the Port Point at the entrance of the Harbour, a For-horn welcome was tooted from the station, and the white ensign on the ship was saluted by the lowering of the flag at the Lighthouse. As soon as the ship was anchored, Chief Magistrate Somerton went on board to pay his respects, and to arrange the official programme for the day. The Governor and Lady Allardyce, accompanied by Captain Johnston and Major Wilberforce-Bell, came ashore immediately, and were officially received at the landing by Mr. Somerton. A pleasing feature of the landing was the presence and introduction to Lady Allardyce of two Girl Guides—Misses Nina Granger and Phyllis Eriksen, who were accepted by Lady Allardyce with the label of her coat and revealed to the girls her Girl Guide emblem, the action on her part, and all that the emblem conveyed of mutual interest, was noticed and appreciated by many of the onlookers as well as by the Girl Guides.

The Governor and Lady Allardyce were heartily cheered by the crowd as they passed on to the Parish Hall. In the passing they paused to view the well proportioned arch (made of fir and decorated with flags) and to read the working on it. This was done in white letters on a red back ground. On the water side of the arch were the words:

**TRINITY WELCOMES HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR AND LADY ALLARDYCE. GOD SAVE THE KING.**

Having passed under the arch they returned to read the wording on the town side of it, which was:

**FAITHFUL SERVICE, FALKLAND, FIJI, TASMANIA.**

**LADY ALLARDYCE. GOD BLESS HER.**

The Governor and Lady Allardyce smiled approval of the welcome thus expressed, and it was evident to us that the words Falkland, Fiji, Tasmania brought to them many happy memories of years of official residence in those distant parts of the Empire; and which, in a sense they hardly expected to be reminded of in far away Trinity, Newfoundland.

Upon their arrival at the Parish Hall (which was filled to capacity) Little Rosalie Morris presented a bouquet of flowers to Lady Allardyce, and she was rewarded by her gracious thanks, and a kiss that Rosalie will remember for many years to come. Then an address of welcome to the Governor and Lady Allardyce was read by Mr. Somerton, and it was delightfully responded to by the Governor. After this, several of the town representatives—including Mr. Reginald

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**NEW ATLANTIC CABLE.**
