The programme consisted of English and French songs, Swedish, English, Polish, fairy ballet and other dances by various pupils, who acquitted themselves with great distinction. Lady Allard presented the cup donated by Mrs. Williams for basket ball competition, Inform, and Lt-Col. Walter Rendell, the shield. The former was won by Form 6, and the shield given for competition among the various patrols of Spencer College Guide Companies, was won by Clover Patrol, Leader, Esther Cennell. Lady Allard congratulated the pupils and College on the excellent progress made and work done by the institution. The programme concluded with solo dancing by Jeanette Cennell and Biddy Baird, Gordon Baird and Lorna Bowring. The last item was the Dance of the Seasons, in which some 20 costumed girls took part. The dancing was very prettily executed. Miss Cherrington addressed the audience and invited them to visit the classrooms and see the work exhibited by the Kindergarten department, art department, needle and fancy work, samples of which were displayed on the walls of two classrooms. After inspection of the work the audience returned to the auditorium, where refreshments were served some 400 persons by the ladies of Spencer Club. During the afternoon the Girl Guides, through Lieut. Shirley Green, made a presentation of a coffee percolator to Capt. Nash, officer in charge of Spencer College Guides, in appreciation of her work for the guides during her time in the College. Miss Nash suitably replied.
