Pablic and High School Laws. The present bill before the Ontario Legilature to amend the Public and High School Laws is composed of no less than seventy-five sections. It provides that the present Council of Public In-struction shall be augmented by the addition of three members, to be elected, one each by the legally qualified masters and teachers of High Schools and Colle-giste Institutes, and by the qualified teachers of Public and Separate Schools. These members are to be elected in August of the present year. The mem-bers elected by the Public School Inspec-tors and by the masters and teachers of the High Schools and collegiste institutes are to continue in office for one year, and Separate Schools for two years, to be reckoned from the time of their election.
