His style is easy, logical and forcible; his language is simple, terse and chaste. Mr. Cushing appeals to the intellect and not to the passions. Of commanding presence and ingratiating mien he forces the unremittant attention of his auditory.

A striking and commendable feature of Mr. Cushing's mode of speech is the entire lack of any harsh or poignant utterance. He does not believe that abuse constitutes argument. The most ardent anti-prohibitionist present yesterday could not possibly have taken oftense at anything that was said. They might have gone prepared to ignore any disregard of their feelings; they must have left, if not convinced, at least firmly possessed of the fact that no more carnest, candid and scholarly opponent of their cherished opinions has ever been heard in this city.

Mr. Cushing's address was on the relation of man to drink, a theme which he handled with infinite tact and judgment. His facts were invincible. He showed that alechol, useful when used as a chemical, served no good purpose as a drink. Alcohol as a beverage was the devil in solution. Mr. Cushing explained the injurious effects of alcohol on the brain, and asserted that saloon-keepers dealt in a brain poison. Drink, he said, defiled man's body, which was the temple of the Holy Ghost; it robbed him of his glory and made him contented with shame. No brief report can do the least justice to Mr. Cushing's masterly treatment of the scientific, adjoined to the moral, aspect of alcoholism. Mr. Cushing is to give two further lectures in this city. The first will be to ladies only to-morrow afternoon in Somerset Hall, and the second in the evening at the First Congregational Church. "Does Prohibition Prohibit?" will be his subject on the latter occasion. No one who enjoys a good speech, aside from any other consideration, should miss hearing Mr. Cushing.

### THE OPEN FORUM.

The London General Hospital.

To the Editor of the ADVENTISER:
Having recently been a patient in the London General Hospital for a month in consequence of injuries sustained in an accident, I deem it but right to put on record a few lines in commendation of that worthy institution and expressive of my deep nense of gratitude to the staff for their uniform kindness and attention. There is no doubt that very many cases, particularly those of a more serious type, can be best treated in an institution under the constant supervision of competent physicians, where medical appliances and remedies are ready at hand, and where skilled trained nurses devoted to their avocation are on duty both night and day. To secure similar favoring conditions is hardly possible in many homes. What I have observed goes to confirm this view, and from all I can learn the old time prejudice against "going to the hospital" naturally appears to be wearing away. There were there paying patients (who comprise about one-fifth of the total number) occupying private wards under special treatment by some of the foremost physicians in the city. The authorities have been unable to receive numbers of such patients. This is to be deplored from financial consideration if for no other reason, because, besides their pay the hospital receives the Government per capita, so that they really help to make the institution self-sustaining.

As readers of the ADVERTISER are aware, the capacity of the institution is altogether inadequate to present requirements, and proposals have been under consideration for a new building out-and-out on a new site, or the erection of an additional wing and the rearrangement of the existing structure. Whatever course is taken, provision should be made, not merely for the present, but for years to come; or the plans adopted should admit of future extensions, as may become necessary by the growing population of the city and vicinity.
