Prince Ching Reaches Pekin

Under Escort of British and Japanese Cavalry.

Waiting Now for Li Hung Chang-Sharp Diplomatic Contest Anticipated-Meanwhile Many Massacres by

Pekin, Sept. 5-Via Shanghai, Sept. | a Pekin source, usually reliable, that 14.—Prince Ching arrived here yesterday, accompanied by an escort of British and Japanese cavalry. He spent the night in his own palace. Sharp diplamatic play is expected for an advantage, but any definite negotiations will Chang shall have arrived and the question of his authority be disposed of. The Russians expect Li Hung Chang to arrive within a few days. They do not want to commit themselves in any way until his arrival.

UNDER MILITARY RULE.

London, Friday, Sept. 14-4 a.m.-No further light is thrown this morning upon Li Hung Chang's intended movements. The Times has an interesting dispatch from Pekin, dated

Sept. 4, which says in part: "Russia has decided to withdraw her legation from Pekin, leaving a purely military command. An official announcement is expected today. The other powers will also presumably withdraw their legations, leaving Pekin under the military control of the allies during the winter at least. At a meeting of the generals the Russian commander announced that Russia would maintain 15 000 troops during the win-FOR SALE—134 SYDENHAM STREET—ter. In the best informed quarters the opinion is expressed that Russia and Germany are acting in accord, Russia seeking the definite alienation of all territory north of the Great Wall, and Germany the annexation of Shan Tung, Klang Su and the Yang The previnces. Russia seeks to restore the power of the empress dowager and the emperor in order to be able to wield her influence through them over the remaining provinces. The

DISMEMBERMENT OF CHINA seems almost inevitable. The empress dowager has retained Prince Ching's son as a hostage for his father. Great Britain's reply to the Russian proposition for the evacuation of Pekin was sent two days ago, and as

forecasted, Great Britain declines to evacuate Pekin prior to receiving satisfactory guarantees from the Chinese Government for the fulfillment of certain conditions. St. Petersburg, Sept. 13.-The Russian Government adheres firmly to its proposal to evacuate Pekin, and continues to cherish the hope Germany will end by agreeing to it. and thus induce Great Britain to follow. It is explained, however, that Russia recognizes the impossibility of

the allies leaving Pekin unless the Chinese Government immediately ters, so that there should not be an interval without a government. Russia over the entire island .. cannot therefore move before the termination of the negotiations now begun for guaranteeing order in Pekin by the installation of a government immediately after the evacuation. PLENTY OF PROMISES. Washington, Sept. 13.-Minister Wu

has received a cablegram from Li Hung Chang that his powers are sufficient to protect American lives and interests in China, and he will see that the protection is given. The crisis that was near at hand

yesterday over the evacuation proposal of the Russian Government has been averted, for a time at least, and the diplomatic side of the matter has become again the object of attention. The order of Gen. Chaffee to leave at once, which was expected in some quarters, did not issue today. Instead earnest efforts are making to arrange the preliminaries for the negotiations which are expected finally to settle the

Chinese troubles. As Li cannot reach the capital from Shanghai, starting tomorrow, inside of a week, it may be that there will be no developments in the international situation in that period of time.

ATROCITIES. Yokohama, Sept. 12.-A Japanese officer at Chsong, Corea, reports that two

Japanese and several hundred Chinese and Corean converts have been murdered on the frontier by the Chinese. A Pekin dispatch, dated Sept. 3, says: The Russian and French groops who are now arriving are committing frightful atrocities. At Tung Chow they outraged and killed women and children. The Japanese commander

has made formal complaint.
The reports of the Chinese raids on the Tonquin and Corean borders are regarded as suggestive, and preparing Europe and the United States for French and Japanese operations in the regions wherein they are respectively interested, similar to the operations of Russia in Manchuria.

BRITISH AT HONG KONG. Hong Kong, Sept. 13.-The British infantry on the transports, which recently arrived here, have been order-ed to embark at this place. The cavalry will proceed north.

Houston, Texas, Sept. 13 .- From all parts of the United States and some portions of England many thousands of dollars are pouring into this city for the relief of the destitute storm sufferers. Train loads of provisions and clothing are hurrying toward Houston

and Galveston. There are 25,000 homeless in that city to be taken care of, and it is a question whether Galveston can or will be rebuilt. H. P. O'CONNOR, Q.C.

Biographical Sketch of a Former Mem

ber of the Legislative Assembly.

Hamilton Parke O'Connor, whose death at Watford was briefly announcself an able and conscientious mem-Mr. O'Connor's great strength ber. He was born in London, Ont., in 1844. His grandfather who was a captain in the 96th Regiment, came to Canada in clerk of the division court at Tees water. Ont. H. P. O'Connor received his education at the Goderich Gramand finally entered upon the study of C. J. Sealey, a young man of Galves- law. He was called to the bar of Ontario in 1878, and was appointed queen's counsel by the provincial government in 1890. His first public position was that of mayor of Walkerton, which office he filled in 1880 and 1881. The following year he was elected to the Ontario Legislature for South Bruce to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of R. M. Wells upon the latter's elevation to the commons. Mr. O'Connor was returned to the legislature by acclamation at the general election in 1883, and was re-elected in 1886 and 1890. He took an active part in the debates in the house on the Liberal side. More than once his name was mentioned in connection with positions in the cabinet, but he continued a private member until he dropped out of politics a few years ago.
