THE KAISER'S SON

CAUGHT BY CUPID

Ready to Renounce His Claim to the Throne.

FATHER AND SON HAVE A SCENE

French Tourists and Guides Killed During a Snowstorm on Mount Blanc.

Paris, Aug. 11.—The Matin declares that the Crown Prince of Germany, after an escapade at Bonn, where he is attending the university, had a violent interview with Emperor William. It is said that he expressed to his father his desire to renounce his rank and claim to the throne. A lady is supposed to be concerned in the affair.

PERISHED ON MOUNT BLANC.

Two French tourists and their guides lost their lives on Saturday on Mount Blanc. They were overtaken by a terrible snowstorm while descending the grand plateau. The two tourists perished in the snow, and the guides set off to obtain assistance from the French Alps, but to the fact that they were unable to reach the hut, and also perished.

NO PLACE FOR GUILLOTINE.

Paris is in an anomalous position vis-a-vis the rest of France in regard to murders. Anyone can make away with his fellow-man without losing his head there. This is not due to a development of humanitarian sentiments, but to the fact that the guillotine since La Fayette Prison was razed to the ground, has been unable to reach the hut, and also perished.

A NEW CAMPANILE.

The mayor of Venice, Count Grimani, makes the following statements regarding the re-erection of the fallen tower:

"In about two months from now the rebuilding will commence, and it is expected that the tower will rise as beautiful as ever, but stronger and more attractive in its interior arrangements."

"We will be able to replace the Loggia Sansovino with much of its original material. The great advantage of the stone and metal work was not injured in the fall. The statue of Mercury, for instance, was found almost unscathed, and the bronze hand has not even been scratched."

"The rebuilding will take five years. It will cost \$2,000,000, of which half is covered by subscription."

"A committee of architects is now investigating all the historical buildings of the city with a view to repairing any damage that may show. Venice is not asking for subscriptions to rebuild its great monuments, but any contributions to our funds will be thankfully received."

IRISH STAND ALOOF.

At a meeting of the Irish Nationalist parliamentarian party in Dublin on Saturday, John Redmond, who occupied the chair, said the party had formally withdrawn from participation in the coronation celebration, and had assembled for the purpose of protesting against the usurpation of Irish government by England. King Edward, he added, was not a native of Ireland, and no English sovereign had been so since the union. A resolution was adopted declaring that "Irishmen are not prepared to take part in the rejoicing of her mercenary oppressors, and stands apart in her rightful discontent and dissatisfaction."

QUEEN HENRIETTE.

Spa, Belgium, Aug. 11.—Marie Henriette, Queen of the Belgians, had a good night, and was able to leave her bed this morning for breakfast. Serious rumors were current last night that the condition of Queen Marie Henriette was dangerous, but at a late hour her majesty's physicians reported that she had revived and that there was no cause for anxiety.

Cut the Cable.

Washington, Aug. 11.—Minister Bowen has called the state department from Caracas, Venezuela, that the revolutionists have cut the cable at Barcelona.

Stratford Man Poisoned.

Stratford, Aug. 11.—Thomas Lang, an old resident of Palmerston, committed suicide Saturday by taking a dose of strychnine. His mind is supposed to have suddenly become deranged.

Robbed Twelve Times.

Stratford, Aug. 11.—The store of Mrs. H. S. O'Connor, corner of Downie and Milton streets, and J. B. Badour's shoe store were broken into Saturday night and a considerable amount of goods and money were abstracted. The private telephone wire to the central had been cut, preventing any warning being given to the police. This is the twelfth time Badour's store has been burglarized.

SEVERAL NOTABLE INCIDENTS OF THE KING'S CORONATION

Touching Exhibition of Tenderness After His Son's Formal Kiss and Pledge of Allegiance.

His Majesty's Impulsive and Father-Like Embrace.

BRILLIANT THROG THRILLED

King Happy as His People—Symphony for the Aged Prole—Pope's Cordial Message.

London, Aug. 11.—The King is crowned, and every man and every woman, too, seems to feel a personal gratification in the event. The stupefaction of six weeks ago is contrasted by the delight of the ever-memorable day and night. At most, it was expected that an invalid King might totter feebly to the chair of Edward the Confessor. What was seen was a King, erect and virile, bearing in a certain paleness the evidence of recent pain, but

LET THEMSELVES LOOSE.

But it was for the King and Queen themselves that the people really let themselves loose. Throughout the day wherever and whenever their majesties were seen, the cheers were loud and long, and especially was this so on the return journey of the King and Queen to Buckingham Palace.

Until the booming of guns announced that the crowning of King Edward and Queen Alexandra had been accomplished, there lingered in thousands of minds a nervous apprehension that even at the last moment some untoward event might once more plunge the nation into consternation. When this was passed, the unrestrained jubilation was as much a tribute to the King's popularity as it was an evidence of relief from the tension of the last few weeks. So, while the scenes on the streets were robbed of those elements that usually accompany a great pageant, they will long be remembered, perhaps somewhat tenderly, by those who stood on the stands, at windows, and on the sidewalks to see King Edward after he had won his crown almost from the jaws of death.

IN THE ABBEY.

In Westminster Abbey the scene was nothing less than marvelous. Nearly seven thousand members of the nobility, the clergy and the gentry had gathered, with foreign princes, ambassadors, colonial rulers, Indian potentates and leaders from the furthest quarters of the globe, where the Union Jack flies, to do honor to the King.

Nearly one hundred Americans must have witnessed the ceremony in the abbey. Among them were Mrs. Cushman, Mrs. Davis and Mrs. Wilcox. Mrs. Post, Mrs. Dudley Leigh, Miss Astor, Mr. and Mrs. Chas. T. Yerkes, Lady Barrymore and Lady Michael Herbert. The only peers who could not be present were the Duke of Devonshire, the Duke of Norfolk, the Earl of Shrewsbury, who was prominent in connection with international polo, the Marquis of Winchester, and Lord De Ros.

THE KING'S GIFT.

King Edward has signaled his coronation in a memorable manner by the munificent gift to the nation of Osborne House, one of the favorite residences of the late Queen Victoria. The gift is made in the following manner: His majesty addressed to Prime Minister Balfour:

"Buckingham Palace, Coronation Day, 1902.—Under the will of the King's beloved mother, the Queen, the Osborne House estate, as Mr. Balfour is aware, the private estate of the sovereign. Having to spend a considerable part of the year in the capital of this kingdom and in its neighborhood, at Windsor, and having also strong home ties in the county of Norfolk, which have existed now for nearly 40 years, the King feels he will be unable to make adequate use of Osborne House as a royal residence, and he, accordingly, has determined to offer the property in the Isle of Wight as a gift to the nation."

"As Osborne House is sacred to the memory of the late Queen, it is the King's wish that with the exception of those apartments which were in the personal occupation of her majesty, his people shall always have access to the house, which must ever be associated with her beloved name. As a residence for the King, the Osborne House may be devoted to national purposes, and be converted into a convalescent home for officers of the navy and the army, whose health has been impaired in rendering service to their country."

If, in order to give full legal effect to the King's wishes, it is found that the necessary steps are in due course taken.

ROBED IN CLOTH OF GOLD

Description of Her Majesty's Dress and Princess of Wales' Gown.

What most struck the eye in the abbey was the marvelous display of jewels, that certainly surpassed anything previously seen at a court function in England. The combination of these with the magnificent robes and beauty of many of their wearers, made a memorable sight.

The Queen's dress was magnificent. It was of cloth of gold, veiled with ivory white tulle, and the train was of velvet lined with ermine. The costume was ornamented with elaborate gold embroidery, and the tulle over-dress was embroidered with roses, thistles and shamrock. It finished in a high transparent collar of old lace, edged with gold.

The Princess of Wales' gown was of English materials and manufacture. It had a long court train of purple velvet, edged with miniver and trimmed with wide bands of gold. A miniver cape was fastened at the shoulders with hooks of gold. The crown itself was of pure white

sat in, embroidered in three shades of gold and was jeweled elaborately with pearls and diamonds.

THE TROOPS.

The troops present were picked regiments of the army, and the bands of music were the best of the English barracks could send out. In the background of the scene was Westminster Abbey, so transformed by decorations and stands that it was scarcely recognizable, and tiered rows of gaily-dressed people rose in tiers of seats from the roadway on each side to a great height. Near the west door of the abbey stood a double line of soldiers in blue uniforms, with white straw hats, making a block of color in the line of troops. Behind them, in a blaze of gold, the band of the Royal Horse Guards waited for the King.

AN INNOVATION.

Suddenly, in the midst of all this old world pageantry, occurred an absolutely modern unprecedented incident. For the first time in any English coronation the troops saluted a motor car. It was that of the Duke of Connaught, in command of the troops in London, making his final round of inspection to see that all was well. He was recognized and loudly cheered. Then the last of the peers' carriages dashed by.

THE KING'S NURSES.

A wild welcome was accorded to the two nurses of the King during his illness, as they came up to the abbey, just in front of the royal carriage and pair which brought the children of the Prince of Wales. The nurses wore blue print dresses and white caps and aprons of their hospital.

FESTIVITIES GO ON.

The festivities in London were continued on Sunday. The coronation procession took place almost all day long in the vicinity of Buckingham Palace and along the route of yesterday's procession, viewing the decorations and watching the flow of notable personages to and from the various thanksgiving services. In the evening the coronation banquet, which was an exceptional novelty for Sunday, was brilliantly illuminated, was a great center of attraction and served to bring an immense concourse of people into its neighborhood.

THE CANADIAN ARCH.

The Times, reviewing the decorations, has a criticism of the main arch of the West Wall, which is the chief feature of the route in Whitehall. It has been renovated, and fresh inscriptions have been placed on the side facing the abbey. The great spread lettering reads: "Canada, Free Homes for Millions, God Bless the Royal Family." The Times observes that if the truth were told there is no lack of folks to speak in tones of sub-arcadian of the uses of advertisement, adding good-humoredly that the royal family, though happily numerous, does not quite amount to millions, and is not at present in want of free homes. On the other side of the arch, there is a scroll with red letters, reading: "Canada, Great Britain's Granary in War and Peace."

REJOICING EVERYWHERE.

While the coronation was being solemnized in London, celebrations and rejoicings were carried out throughout the colonies. Numerous cablegrams to the King conveyed the congratulations of representative bodies everywhere, salutes were fired and church services were held. Australia confined itself to religious services, having spent all the money gathered for the proposed erection of a new cathedral. Similar services were held by the British communities in all the European capitals and chief cities of the continent. The congratulations of European sovereigns also poured in. Soon after the King's return to the palace the Pope sent him an especially cordial message to his people in the Vatican.

THE UNITED STATES BATTLESHIP ILLINOIS.

At Chatham dockyard, was decorated. Throughout the United Kingdom the cities were illuminated and enthusiastic demonstrations were held.

Manila, Aug. 10.—Forty-one American cruisers and battleships, and a number of warships were dressed at Cavite yesterday, and fired 21 guns at noon in honor of the coronation of King Edward.

THE DAY IN THE DOMINION

Coronation Day, 1902.—Coronation Day was quietly observed here, it being celebrated at a partial holiday. The public offices and a good many of the wholesale warehouses were closed, but nearly all of the retail shops did business as usual. A salute of 21 guns was fired at 7 a.m. by the Toronto Field Battery, and the church bells and fire bells were rung, steam whistles blown and a general honor paid to the joyful moment. In the morning coronation services were held in St. James Cathedral and St. Andrew's Cathedral, while a number of other churches held services. The proceedings closed at night with a grand illumination. There were miles of sailing lights. In some sections the pyrotechnics were gorgeous. From High Park on the west, to Munroe Park on the east, beaches, the wharves and the islands, huge bonfires blazed and Roman candles, sky rockets and red fire burned in great profusion. To complete the interesting picture hundreds of boats in the bay were decorated with colored lanterns and bunch lights of red, white and blue.

Ottawa, Aug. 11.—Ottawa's celebration of the King's coronation was very quiet. At 7 o'clock the Earl of Dufferin, commanding the Canadian garrison, inspected the Ottawa garrison on Parliament Hill. Services were held in Anglican churches, but were very sparsely attended. His Excellency the Governor-General cabled the King in behalf of himself, the Government and the Canadian people, congratulating him upon his recovery, and expressing gratification on his coronation.

An interesting incident in connection with the firing of the royal salute on Saturday by the Second Field Battery of Nepean Point, was the firing of the first gun by a Sergeant Clifford, a veteran of the British navy, who assisted in firing a royal salute on a warship at Calcutta on the occasion of the coronation of Queen Victoria.

Clifford was decorated with the honor by special permission of Col. Hodgins, D. O. C. Twelve thousand people crowded the grand stand at [Continued on page 5.]
