

# IRISH CATHOLIC GETS THE POST

Sir Anthony MacDonnell, Brother of a Nationalist M.P.

THE TIMES VOICES DISCONTEN

O'Brien's Paper Abuses the Irish Who Welcomed Lord Dudley

to Connemara.

London, Oct. 29.-The official announcement of the appointment of Sir Anthony Patrick MacDonnell to the post of permanent under secretary of Ireland in succession to Sir David Harrell, leads the Times this morning to an editorial display of veiled discontent. The paper says the removal of Sir David Harrell on pension while his energy and powers are unabated causes surprise and hints that Sir David wanted to have the crimes act enforced in Ireland earlier than it was, but that he was overruled in higher quarters. The Times explains that the under secretary for Ireland is always in close touch with the Irish constabulary and that Sir David was formerly an officers of this organiza-

The paper points out that Sir Anthony Patrici. MacDonnell is an Irishman and a Catholic, that his brother, Mark Anthony MacDonnell, is a Nationalist member of the House of Commons, and reads Sir Anthony a lesson in acting with absolute neutrality in his new position, drawing the line clearly between sentiment and policy.
