

### DIVINE HEALING

Interesting Statements Made at a Meeting of the Toronto Ministerial Association.

MINISTERS DISCUSS

Toronto, April 8 .- The General Ministerial Association yesterday had one of the liveliest meeting of the season. The subject was "Divine Healing," by the Lake Ontario from St. John on and the essayist was Pastor Salmon April 18. There are forty teachers in all.
