MORE WINNERS AT THE POULTRY SHOW

Some of the Exhibitors Who Will Carry Away Prizes From the Big Fair.

SOME SPLENDID CATTLE

Are Shown This Year—Advertiser Man Gives His Opinion of the Different Exhibits.

In the cattle sheds yesterday morning the attendants were astir bright and early, putting on the finishing touches, as the judges were to start work at 9 o'clock. Everything in the shape of cleaning and grooming had to be done before that hour, so as to appear in the show ring in the best possible shape to win the red ribbon. It was a beautiful morning, and the sight was a grand one for lovers of stock.

Breeders of cattle and horses, as a rule, make it a point to be on hand Tuesday morning, so that they may see the stock in the ring, where they can see them to the best advantage. Below will be found a few of the winners: Heretofore—W. H. Hunter & Son, Orangeville, shows some fine animals in this class; so also does A. G. Govenlock, Forest. W. H. Hunter wins first on aged bull, a splendid specimen of the breed, turning the scales at 2,300 pounds. A. G. Govenlock, second, with another fine one, weighing 2,300 pounds. Hunter & Son won first on yearling bull; also first on bull calf, Govenlock winning second bull calf. Cows—Govenlock wins first on a beauty; Hunter & Son second. Govenlock wins first 2-year-old heifer; also first yearling. Short horns—James Yule, East Selkirk, Manitoba, has a fine herd, and carried off a number of prizes, winning first aged bull, and first champion cow. John Gardhouse & Son, won well getting second place on aged bull, first on 2-year-old, third on cow 3 year old, and second on 2-year-old. George Glen, Grand Valley, has another fine exhibit in this class. W. G. Pettit, Freeman, is another heavy winner, getting second senior bull, first junior yearling, third senior bull calf, and first junior calf; also first senior heifer, second junior yearling, and fourth senior heifer calf. G. H. Oke, Alvinston, is another large winner. Aberdeen Angus—This is one of the best classes in the show. John Lowe, Elora, won first on aged bull, weighing 2,215 pounds, and first yearling; also first on 2-year-old steer and first on yearling steer. Thomas Broadfoot, Ferguson, shows a good herd. James Bowman, Guelph, won a few, taking second on aged bull, first and third on 2-year-old bull, second yearling, and second third bull calf, and first and second cow, first and second 2-year-old first and third yearling, second and third heifer calf; also champion bull, champion female, first aged herd and first young herd.

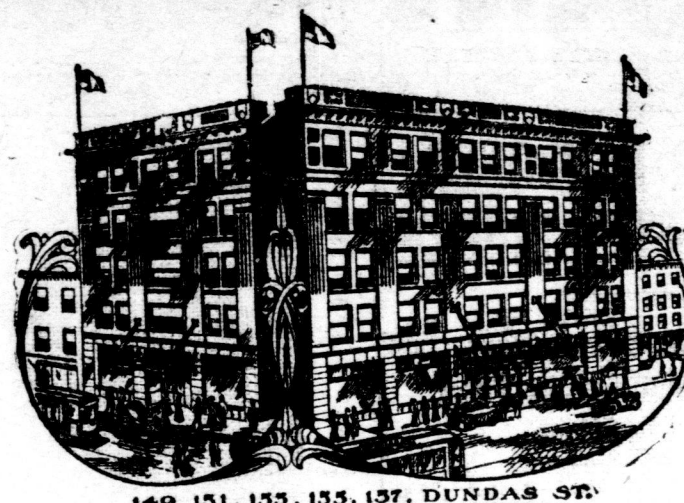
Poultry. All the judging in the Poultry Building was finished yesterday. Below will be found a few more of the winners: Silver Wyandottes—A. Flawn, London, wins first, second, cocks, first cockerel, and first pullet. Peep Day Poultry Yards, London, third cock, first and third hen, and Jas. Arthur, London, second hen, second and third cockerel, and second and third pullet. Golden Wyandottes—Cock, R. H. Saunders, Ealing, first and second, and W. Graham, St. Thomas, third. Hens—R. H. Saunders, first and second, and Graham third.

Cockerels—A. Flawn, London, first, and R. H. Saunders, second and third. Pullets—A. Flawn, first; A. H. Graham, second, and R. H. Saunders, third. Black Wyandottes—G. and J. Bogue, Strathroy, first cock and first cockerel; J. Bogue, first hen and first pullet, and F. B. Davis, second and third pullet. Silver Pencilled—R. Davidson, London, first cock, also first hen; J. R. Johnston, Leamington, second cock, second and third hen. Buff Orpingtons—This was a very large class of good quality, being the biggest exhibit ever shown in London. A number of good birds fell by the wayside. Cocks—J. H. Clarke, Canisville, wins first and third, and H. A. Hoffman, Ridgeway, second. Hens—J. H. Clarke, first and third; and Hoffman second. Cockerels—Clarke first and second and Hoffman third. Pullets—Clarke first and third, and Hoffman second. White Orpingtons—A great improvement noticeable in this class as to quality, also the largest entry ever seen here. Cocks—R. Heard, London, first, and A. H. Westman, Granton, second. Hens—George H. Andrews, London, first; S. F. Ferns, London, second; A. H. Westman, third. Cockerels—F. F. Andrews, London, first; R. Heard, London, second and third. Pullets—F. F. Andrews, first; S. J. Ferns, second; A. H. Westman, third. Black Andalusians—Another good class, with some birds worthy of special mention. Hamilton & Scoyne, London, swept the deck in old birds, both male and female, with the exception of first hen, won by George Holden, of Port Dover. Hamilton & Scoyne won first, second and third cocks, and second and third hens, also first pullet—a peach. Kemp & Waterman, London, won first and second, cockers and George Holden, of Port Dover, third. W. T. Lawrence, London, wins second and third pullets, and a \$1 special given by Hamilton & Scoyne. Hamilton & Scoyne also won special for best collection in this class. Rose Comb Rhode Island Reds—This is another breed coming to the front very fast, and this year's exhibit is away ahead of anything ever shown at the Western. Cocks—Chas. Tinsley, London, first; W. A. 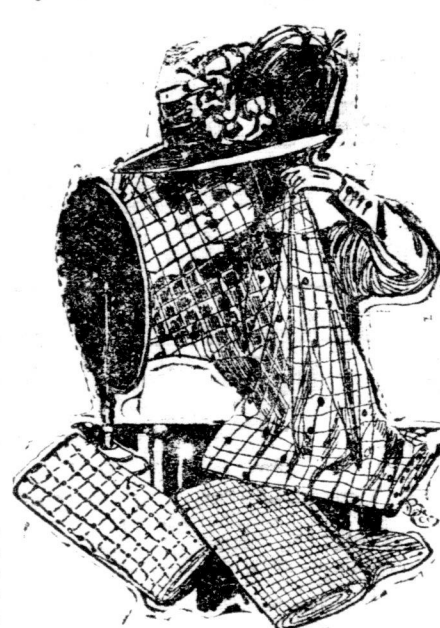

Philadelphia, Sept. 11.—Swimming across the Schuylkill River at Lafayette, a distance of 150 yards, and returning without taking a rest, was the unusual feat of Edith Cugley, seven years old. The little girl has been spending the summer at Lafayette with her parents. Mr. and Mrs. William Cugley, of 5138 Hazel avenue, West Philadelphia, Saturday she obtained permission from her father to try to swim across the river and jumped into the water. An interested throng watched her bravely make her way across the river. Yard by yard, firm strokes brought her to the goal. When she reached the shore the little swimmer, undaunted, started back. The strong current, and a strong wind blowing ahead made the return hard, but she kept her stroke up until her feet touched at her starting place. Notwithstanding her achievement, she is a very modest little girl. "Course it's the longest way I ever swam yet," she said, "but I'll swim lots farther when I'm bigger."

To Swing Around the United States, Covering 13,000 Miles.

Boston, Sept. 15.—Well tanned by more than five weeks on the golf links, and invigorated by the salt sea breezes of Massachusetts Bay, President Taft closed his 40 days' vacation today in excellent voice, and started on his 13,000 miles swing around the country. The President is looking forward to a delightful two months, in which he will meet thousands of people, and to whom his voice will carry strength and conviction as to the purposes of the new administration.

President Taft began his speech-making tour last night at the banquet of the chamber of commerce of Boston. He will resume in Chicago.

The presidential party was driven from the hotel to the train at 9:30 a.m., and boarded the special train of three cars at the south station, which left for the west before 10 o'clock.

OUT OF COMMISSION.
