commission, to the effect that they will

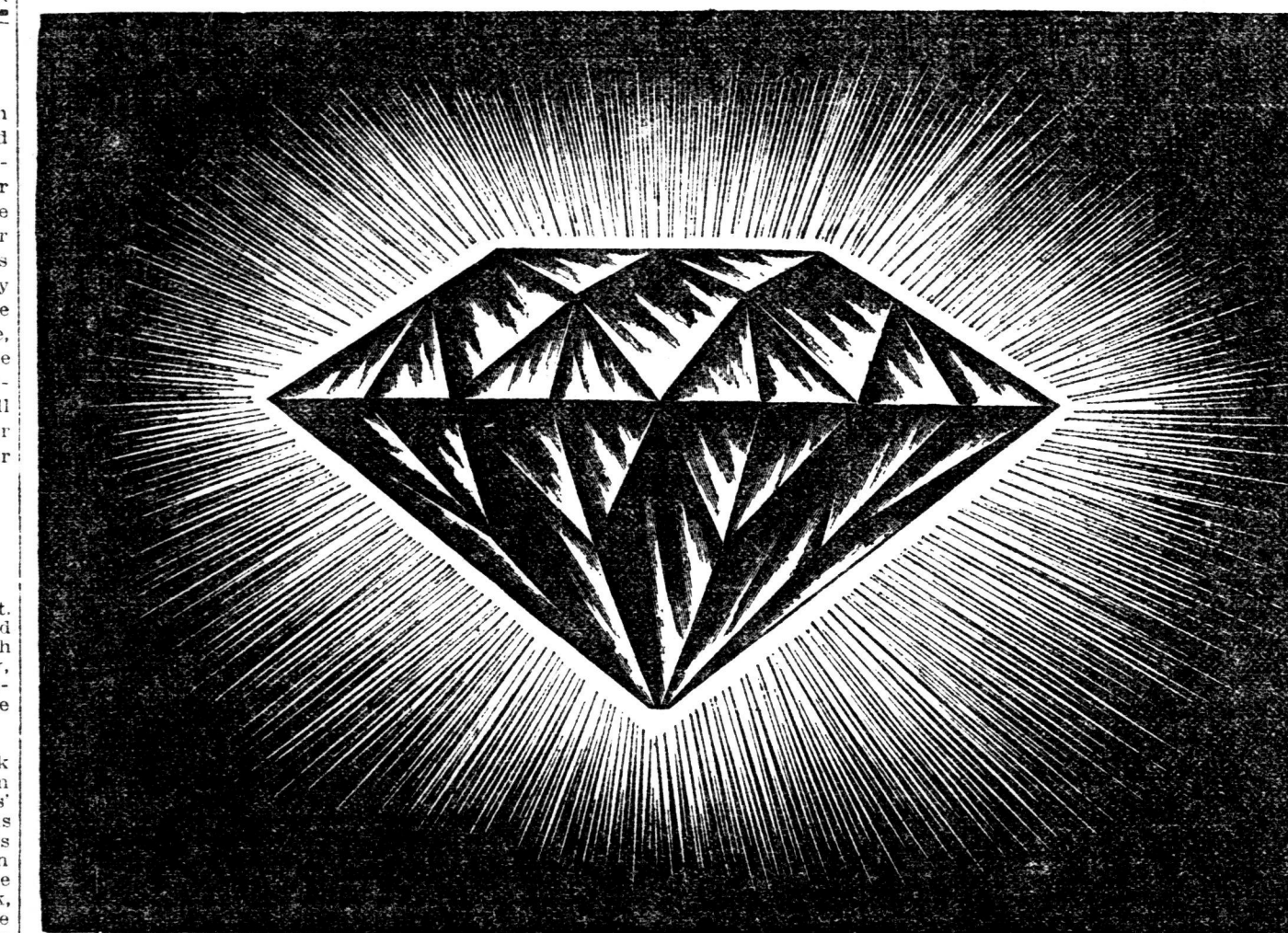
