MR. QUAIT SERVED IN FENIAN RAID

Wife's Death Few Days Before Proves Fatal Shock.

In the death of Richard Quait, which took place on Monday at his residence, 266 Cheapside street, another Fenian raid veteran has been called away. Mr. Quait was one of the body of men which was stationed at Point Edward in the year 1866 to ward off the attack of the Fenians.

He was born near Crumlin in the year 1841, and lived practically all his life in London and vicinity. His parents were among the earliest of pioneer settlers in Hiddlesex County and among the first to hew out a home for themselves in the township of Nisour.

His wife, Margaret Lackey, died on Feb. 9, after a week's illness, and Mr. Quait never recovered from the shock of her death. He is survived by one son, Fred, of Evelyn, and two daughters, Misses Annie and Maggie, at home. The funeral will take place on Thursday afternoon and interment will be made in Woodland Cemetery.

WANT EARLIER CAR

ON S. LONDON LINE

Workmen Complain That 6:20 Is Not an Early Enough Start.

The adoption of the bylaws was the most important item of business transacted by the South London Progressive Association at the regular meeting on Tuesday evening. A committee, composed of President Gerry, Secretary Axford, and Mr. William Smith was appointed at the meeting last week to prepare the constitution, and its report was adopted with a few minor changes.

The same committee was empowered to have the bylaws printed in book-form for distribution among the members. The terms secured by President Gerry in regard to the renting of the hall were accepted by the association. The membership cards were distributed to those present, and this week will be devoted to a campaign for the enrollment of additional members.

Several matters of importance of residents of South London were discussed, among them being the boundaries of the free express deliveries and the street car service in the early morning. The limits set by the express companies exclude at least one-third of South London, and the association will likely take definite action in connection with this question at the next meeting.

The street car service, particularly before 7 a.m., was classified as disgraceful. Many of the working men who reside in South London and in East End factories are compelled to walk as far as Richmond street in the mornings, as the first car around the South London lines arrives there about 6:30.

The late hour at which the first car makes its trip is a great inconvenience to travellers, and they are almost always compelled to walk to the station.

No resolutions were made in connection with either of these matters, but several of the members of the association promised to inquire into the circumstances and report at the next meeting.
