

## SINGLE CANADIANS ENLIST IN FORCE

Predominant Among Recruits  
Coming In From All  
Western Ontario.

STRATFORD SENDS UP 92

Grey and Elgin Busy With  
Prospects for Big  
Drafts.

STRATFORD, Sept. 10. — Stratford sent another fine quota of recruits for the 71st Battalion to London today. There were 21 in the party, and of these, 12 were Canadian-born, 7 were English, and 2 were sons of old Scotland. Two only were married.

From Stratford to date, 92 have been sent to London, and there will be another large list tomorrow. Up to the present, 110 have joined at Stratford, while more than 25 have been taken on at the stations throughout the county.

Among today's recruits were two brothers, Albert and Harold King, both Stratford boys. A father and son, who also enlisted, are Frederick and Joseph R. Tremaine.

very substantial share of trade with foreign countries, considering his entire output. The man whose business has been confined to his own county, to a part of Ontario, to a large slice of the Dominion, is hearing with interest of what others are doing. He is investigating for himself exportation facilities, and inquiring in regard to the Export Association.

A year ago, the outlook seemed dark, and every man was his own pessimist in the commercial world. The months that have intervened have brought about an awakening, and a realization of resources and power.

"Expansion" and "Extension." The Western Ontario manufacturer last year put his hand to the plow, grimly, courageously, and from a sense of duty. This year the old home plow won't do. He wants to ride on a perfectly new steam plow, which is capable of turning over a dozen or more furrows at a time. The Smallest Human Mother  
on Earth.

What would your little girl think if she were to awake and find such a tiny little woman standing at her bedside so small that a child of three years could carry her, yet with a couple of youngsters, a boy and a girl, both so large that mother looks like a wee bit of a fairy? "Old Mother Goose" used to tell of such strange pranks and people, but we never expected to find a mother like this one. It would take a long time for a wise person to find out all about this little woman, and the multitudes are always at the doors of her miniature theatre on the midway, listening, watching, and wondering.



At birth Dolletta was just eight inches tall, and her feet were so small that a silver dollar would make a platform large enough for both of them, and with lots of room to spare. She is at the present time 28 inches tall and weighs only 37 pounds. She is 33 years old, and has a boy and a girl, both children of normal growth. The little girl's head and shoulders above her mother, while the little boy of three is about two inches taller than Dolletta.

The most remarkable feature of this attraction is that both of Dolletta's children were born by means of the hazardous Caesarian operation, the last resource of surgery. It was this alone that enabled the children to see the light of day, and gave Dolletta the distinction of being the only midwife that ever gave birth to normal children.

Dolletta and her children will arrive Sunday from Toronto, where she was by far the feature attraction of the midway at the exhibition. This attraction will be open to the public Monday sure at Western Fair Midway.

## FINGAL FARMER IS KILLED BY HORSE

W. J. Beatty the Victim of  
Tragedy in Heart of  
St. Thomas.

IN FRONT OF CITY HALL

Was Arranging to Send Prize  
Cattle to London  
Fair.

ST. THOMAS, Sept. 10. — W. J. Beatty, a prominent farmer, living on the old Casey farm near Fingal, was instantly killed in St. Thomas about 8 o'clock tonight. He was driving a horse and leading one by a halter. When the horse he was leading was struck by the wheel of the rig, the animal reared up and kicked Mr. Beatty in the chest.

He fell back in the rig and expired almost instantly.

He was about 45 years of age and well known throughout the western section of the county.

Rib Pierces Heart.

The unfortunate man was carried into a physician's office, but was dead. The doctor's examination showed that a rib had been punctured, piercing the heart, causing death.

The accident occurred on Talbot street just as Mr. Beatty was passing the city hall. He was a big man, was in the city arranging to send his prize cattle to London tomorrow for the exhibition.

He came to the township of Southwold from Galt only three weeks ago. He is survived by his wife and two children.

## SAY BRITISH PATROL BOAT USED STARS AND STRIPES

Lapland Passengers Tell of Sinking of  
Submarine.

NEW YORK, Sept. 10. — Another report that a German submarine was sunk on August 19 while shelling the British steamer Nicolson was received here today with the arrival of the steamer Lapland. It was also said that the British patrolboat which sank the submarine flew an American flag while approaching the scene. Just before she was ready to open up with her guns, says the report, the American flag fluttered down to her deck and the British ensign was hoisted in its place.

This German submarine was sunk on August 19, the day the Arabic was torpedoed, and not far from the scene of that tragic event. This gave rise to the report and belief in Great Britain that the Arabic's assailant had been sent to the seabottom.

## EXPLOSION ON SHIP IS FATAL TO THREE

Oil-Laden Schooner Catches Fire From  
Cook's Light.

HALIFAX, N. S., Sept. 10. — Three men are dead as a result of an explosion which occurred early this morning on the Newfoundland schooner Hiawatha, which was loaded to the hatches with oil and gasoline, and was lying at the Bedford basin pier off the Imperial Oil Company's tanks, awaiting a favorable wind for sailing for St. John's, Nfld.

The dead are: James Saunders and William Hooper, seamen, whose charred bodies now lie on the decks of the destroyed schooner, and Capt. Hubert Clarke, master of the vessel, who was taken to the Victoria General Hospital, where he expired shortly before noon. Fred Kirby, seaman, suffered a fractured leg and severe burns. All the members of the crew hail from Burin, Nfld.

The explosion was caused by the ignition of gasoline fumes when Thomas Farrell, the cook, attempted to light a fire in a stove. Farrell saved himself by jumping overboard.

Thirty feet of the wharf to which the Hiawatha was tied was destroyed by the flames.

## REV. WM. FEE'S SON ENLISTED IN WINNIPEG

WTOMING, Sept. 10. — Many local people are interested to learn that Jack Fee is a recent recruit for overseas duties. Jack is the second eldest son of Rev. Wm. M. Fee and Mrs. Fee, living in the vicinity of Winnipeg, who resided in the Presbyterian Manse here during Mr. Fee's pastorate. He was attending university when he responded to his country's call, and is now at Montreal.

Rev. Mr. Fee is at present ill.

employing 30 all the year round. Conditions are reported as "very fair," and the past year declared to be "a good average one."

Last year when Essex County contributed two carloads of flour for Belgian relief, J. Askew & Son of Leamington were allotted an order for half a carload, a fact that placed them on the list of Canadian exporters to the old country.

Reclaiming Waste Land.

An evidence of awakening to possibilities in the farthest south county of Ontario lies in the interest being taken in reclaiming waste lands. Some miles from Leamington was formerly situated "the old Pelee marsh." This has been drained and found splendidly adapted for the growing of onions, 300 acres now being under cultivation for this purpose. It is said that carloads of onions alone are shipped from Leamington to supply the eastern market.

A number of Belgians are employed in the cultivation of the enormous onion patch, and the character given them is "patient, industrious and thrifty."

In the past few years, a large amount of money has been spent by Leamington Town on pavements, sewers and other local improvements. They are beginning to think and talk more of wider markets. They are sharing in the general awakening of Western Ontario and of Canada as a whole. The day is not far distant when it will be impossible to lay at their doors a charge of "under-conception of possibilities."
