States His Reasons. Mr. Bayley then proceeded to list a half dozen reasons for his confident belief that the Ontario temperance act will be sustained on Oct. 23 next.

"First, you have not a large new Canadian population; second, the newspapers are more largely in favor of the O. T. A. than they were in Manitoba; this applies to both city and weekly papers; third, the Moderation League is not sending out reliable envelopers as in Manitoba; speakers as in Manitoba Ontario voters have now to guide them practical examples government control and its fallacy; fifth, you have a great solid rural vote, and sixth, there is a general spirit of ontimism. spirit of optimism, energy and activity among the temperance workers in Ontario in this campaign, which was sadly lacking in the Manitoba cam-

Mr. Bayley is an interesting figure He campaigned on behalf of temperance in England during 1916-17, and in New Zealand during 1918-19. MINERS STRONGEST POLITICAL UNION

British Federation Hopes To Increase Number of Seats in Commons.

HOLD 43 NOW

Associated Press Despatch. London, Oct. 12 .- A review of the activities of organized labor in the political campaign reveals that the miners' federation, the most powerfully organized politically of all the unions, which already holds 43 seats in the coal fields, will concentrate its campaign on the re-election of these, with perhaps an effort to gain three or four more seats, which appear fair

or four more seats, which appear fair game for the miners.

The railwaymen have eleven seats, including Colonial Secretary J. H. Thomas. The railway clerks' association have seven members. John Bromley, secretary of the locomotive engineers' union, is again contesting the constituency of Barrow.


