WIFE OF ST. DAVIDS **BANK MAN SHOOTS** DOWN BURGLAR

Mrs. W. K. Roger Opens Fire on Mat Kolidee When Husband's Life Is in Danger-Robber Caught in House Replies With Revolver Shots When Challenged by Roger.

WIDOW OF DEAD MAN BECOMES HYSTERICAL.

Special to The Advertiser by a Staff Reporter St. Davids, Ont., July 15.-The heroism of a bank manager and his wife, coupled with the adventitious aid of a collie dog and a little gray kitten, resulted in the thwarting early today of an attempt to rob the Imperial Bank quarters here and in the attendant death of the intruder, Mat Koligee, a quarry employee following a battle to the bitter end, in which the manager, W. R. Rogers, was twice wounded and probably had his life saved only by the prompt action of his wife in grabbing a revolver, rushing to his assistance and shooting his assailant

SHOTS AWAKEN NEIGHBORS. The discharge of the first revolver shots awakened the Rogers' neighbors, Mr. and Mrs. A. Woodruff. While Mr. Woodruff ran downstairs to cross over and help the bank manager in his battle, Mrs. Woodruff mounted guard with a shotgun and was prepared to shoot down the bandit if she saw him making his

Mrs. Rogers Tells Story. In describing the events of the night to The Advertiser, Mrs. Rogers said:

"On the second floor of our home in St. Davids there is both a front and back balcony. My husband and I are accustomed to use the latter as sleeping porch.

DOUBTS NECESSITY FOR HOODS AND MASKS.

Canadian Press Despatch. Hamilton, July 15.—Emphatic declaration that the Ku Klux Klau had no connection in letter or in spirit with the Masonic Order in Canada was one of the outstanding features of the address of W. J. Drope, grand master of free masonry in Ontario, at the 70th annual communication of the grand lodge of Canada in this province, which opened its sessions here today. The grand master owing to illness, was unable to be present today to deliver the address, which was read in his absence.

Continuing on the subject of the Ku Klux Klan, the grand master said:

"It is perhaps not within my province, nor do I deem it neces sary at the present time, to express my opinion or make any ruling on the question of members of the Masonic order becoming members of the klan, but I venture to suggest that members of the eldest and most honorable fraternity in the world will do well to consider seriously before associating themselves with an organization which, in a country where the franchise is universal and freedom of speech assured to all, finds it necessary to conceal the identity of its membership behind a hood or mask.
