

## GEN. CURRIE CAUTIOUS IN DISCUSSING POLITICS

Declines To Discuss Present  
Situation—Meets McGill  
Graduates.

TO VISIT STRATHROY

Terms Recent Federal Election  
Unsatisfactory Because  
Not Decisive.

Sir Arthur Currie, president of McGill University, Montreal, and former overseas commander of the Canadian forces in the great war, was the distinguished guest of honor at a dinner given by London graduates of McGill University at the Highland golf club last night.

Sir Arthur, interviewed by The Advertiser immediately upon his arrival in the city at 7:30 p.m., chatted freely of different important subjects, but he was cautious about talking for publication.

He politely declined to discuss the present political situation as the result of the federal election last week, though he did comment upon it as "unsatisfactory because it was not decisive," and observed that "there is no constitutional precedent for Premier King to follow."

Sir Arthur disclaimed the honor "of promoting any plan for world organization of veterans," and when asked as to his opinion of Earl Haig's efforts upon behalf of the amalgamation of all Canadian veterans' organizations, he closed that avenue firmly by saying that "we will have to wait and see the results."

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## THREE LIVES TOLL WHEN CARS CRASH NEAR INDIANA CITY

Mrs. Harriet Dibble, Formerly  
of East Zorra, Daughter,  
Son-in-Law Die.

RELATIVES HERE

Mrs. James Barker, 1162 King  
Street, Is Sister of Accident  
Victim.

Word was received here last night of the death yesterday of Mrs. Harriet Dibble and Mr. and Mrs. Adolph Guerin of Ludington, Mich. The three were fatally injured when their automobile was struck by an interurban car near Kokomo, Ind., Saturday while they were returning to their home in Ludington. Two other occupants, Mary Guerin and Bernard Barber, escaped with minor injuries.

Mrs. Dibble is a sister-in-law of Mrs. James Barker of 1162 King street, London, and a former resident of East Zorra. She is well known in that district, where some of her relatives still reside. Mrs. Dibble visited in London a few months ago. She is survived by three sons and two daughters, Mrs. Guerin, one of the victims, is also a daughter. The funeral services will be held on Thursday at Ludington.

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## ARMENIAN ORPHAN BOYS ENTERTAINED IN LONDON

Refugees From Oppressive Rule of Ottomans Provide Program  
Yesterday Afternoon in Central Collegiate Auditorium As  
Publicity For Armenian Relief Work.

Twenty-five good-looking, virile young Armenian boys were guests in London yesterday. They were lads from ten to sixteen years of age, and who are at present at the farm of the Armenian Relief association, at Georgetown. Practically all were orphans, having lost their parents in the terrible massacres perpetrated on the Christians of Armenia, by the Moslem Turks. Removed from the scenes of such tragic associations, the boys have been brought to Canada, here to develop into Canadian citizens.

The boys arrived in London yesterday afternoon in charge of the Rev. John Pierce, of Toronto, one of the officials of the Armenian Relief society. At the station they were met by a body of local citizens, headed by Duncan McDermid, chairman of the London Armenian Relief association. Other members of the welcome party were E. J. Jenkins, general secretary of the Y. M. C. A., and M. C. A. who looked after them for most of their stay here. Mrs. Gammage and Mrs. A. T. Edwards, representing the "Women's" Institutes, and E. W. Moore, representing the London Kiwanis club.

On their arrival, the boys were taken to the Y. M. C. A., where they enjoyed the swimming pool to the utmost. Later on in the afternoon the boys visited the Central collegiate institute, where they were welcomed by Principal E. A. Miller. A short program partly by the boys and partly by the pupils of the collegiate was given here.

Previous to going to McCormick's dining hall, where they had supper with the delegates to the convention of Women's Institutes, now meeting in this city, the boys went on a march of the downtown streets headed by the boy scouts. After the march they were taken in cars to McCormick's. The work of the mission was explained to the delegates and their hearty support was pledged to the work.

On the conclusion of the supper the boys went to the Central collegiate institute, where a concert and moving picture program was held for their benefit. This morning after a drive into the city, they will return to Georgetown.

It is hoped that many citizens will be induced to adopt one of these boys into their homes. Some fifteen are receiving a training and an education to better fit them to play their part in Canada's life.

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## BRITAIN REMOVES EMBARGO ON LOANS

Government Decides To Lift  
Ban On Colonial and  
Foreign Loans.

Sheffield, Eng., Nov. 3.—Winston Churchill, chancellor of the exchequer, in a speech here tonight announced that the government had decided to remove the embargo on the issue of domestic, colonial and foreign loans in London.

"The old full freedom of the money market will be restored," he said, and the city of London must be responsible for using it wisely and soberly. Over-lending, such as lending beyond our strength, straining at future credit, lending beyond our savings, will bring its own correctives.

The issue of foreign loans in Great Britain has been for a long time prevented from leaving the country by the embargo which has been recently lifted. It was felt that the benefit not only of investors, but British trade, since the money so invested would be used to purchase British goods.

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## MEMORIAL FUND CAMPAIGN PLANNED

Local Committee Prepares To  
Raise Their Share of Endowment Fund.

Active preparations for the campaign to raise London's share of the proposed \$500,000 endowment fund for Queen Alexandra Sanatorium as a tribute to the memory of the late Sir Adam Beck, were advanced at a meeting of the local campaign committee held in chamber of commerce headquarters here yesterday afternoon. London's share of the objective in the province-wide campaign is \$75,000, and the campaign to raise this amount will be held during the week of Nov. 20 to 28 simultaneously with similar efforts in all sections of Ontario, the sanatorium not being merely a London institution, but province-wide in the scope of the work undertaken for the relief and cure of sufferers from tuberculosis.

It was announced at yesterday afternoon's meeting that arrangements to make known the objects and details of the campaign will be very complete, and the story of Sir Adam Beck's work in establishing and building up Queen Alexandra Sanatorium will be widely disseminated through many and varied channels. Plans are under way to have news of the campaign broadcasted by radio from time to time from radio stations all over the province. It is also confidently expected that an announcement concerning the campaign and its objects will be made from every pulpit in Ontario, both Catholic and Protestant, on Sunday, Nov. 22. A committee was appointed at yesterday's meeting to confer with the local ministerial alliance and with authorities of the Roman Catholic churches here, in regard to this feature of the educational campaign.

Plans for the local canvass are already well advanced and are so complete as to make success a practical certainty. Captains of divisions have already been named and team captains are also being appointed. It is expected that a complete list of workers in the campaign, totalling about 200, will be ready by the end of this week. A meeting of the team captains was decided upon for 7:30 next Tuesday evening, and this will be followed later by a meeting of the whole campaign personnel, at which the effort will be formally launched. It is planned to have several special speakers for this occasion.

Preparation of lists of prospective subscribers is rapidly nearing completion, and the campaign committee has every confidence that Londoners will not fail to contribute their share towards insuring that Sir Adam Beck's great work will be carried on. Those present at yesterday's meeting were G. F. Pearson, E. V. Buchanan, J. E. McConnell, P. J. Mahle and A. E. Silverwood.
