FATAL ACCIDENT IN MIRAMICHI MILL

Allan MacDonald, Millwright, Killed in Machinery.

Last Friday morning about five minutes to seven, before the mill whistle had blown for work to commence, Allan MacDonald of Chatham was killed at Sinclair's mill at Bridgetown. It seems that he was going from the mill to the yard and in some unknown manner his clothing got caught in the pillar shaft and he was whirled around so that before the machinery could be stopped he had been killed. The deceased had worked around and in mills all his life, and was one of the best men in the business on the Miramichi, being millwright in Sinclair's at the time of his death.

The deceased is survived by one brother, James J. of Bartibogue, and the following children: Alexander, Chatham; Allan, who was working with him in Newcastle; Miss Minnie, Chatham; Miss S. G., student nurse in Somerville, Mass.; Miss Nellie, student nurse in Amherst; and Mrs. James Doyle of Jacques River.

FATAL ACCIDENT IN MIRAMICHI MILL

Clarence Hoare, Aged Five Years, Met Death While Crossing Street in Stellarton.

Stellarton Aug. 5—Clarence Hoare, a five year old son of Thomas Hoare, was almost instantly killed on the bridge Street Crossing near the station at six o'clock tonight. The local train, driven by engineer Henderson, was coming in very fast, and the little child in attempting to cross was caught by the cow catcher. The crossing in question is a very dangerous one, and many accidents have occurred at that point. Much sympathy is felt for the father and mother and the family now bereaved.

Clarence Hoare, Aged Five Years, Met Death While Crossing Street in Stellarton.

TINY CRAFT HALTED OCEAN LINER

Captain Day and Crew of the Detroit All Well.

New York, August 5—A tiny boat a thousand miles at sea, flying signals of distress, seen by officers of the Hamburg-American line steamer America, which arrived here tonight, proved to be the 35 foot power boat Detroit, which left New York for St. Petersburg on July 15, with Captain Thomas Fleming Day as its venturesome commander. The ocean liner slowed down and headed for the small boat when the signals were sighted, but when Captain Knauth, of the America got within speaking distance of the little craft, Captain Day informed him that he had hoisted the signals merely to attract attention, so that he could send word back to New York that all was well with him and his crew.

The Detroit, at the time on July 22, was in latitude 46.54 North and longitude 28.42 West, approximately 1,000 miles off the Irish coast. Captain Day reported having had generally good weather.

He is planning to outdo his voyage of last year, when he sailed from Providence R. I., to Rome in the tiny yawl, Seabird.

JUMPED FROM THE EIFFEL TOWER

Elegantly Dressed Unknown Woman Commits Suicide in Paris.

An elegantly dressed young woman jumped from the topmost platform of the Eiffel Tower lately. Her body struck the ironwork as it fell and was almost torn in half. The limbs were severed before the body fell to the second platform, 525 feet below, where it was smashed beyond recognition. Four hundred francs were found in the pocket of the woman, and also the address of a hotel where she was not known. The attendants say the woman was weeping before she jumped. She scribbled something in a notebook, but afterwards tore this up. The body has not been identified.

TERRIBLE DISASTER IN COAL MINE

Bochum, Germany, Aug. 8—Six hundred and fifty miners were imprisoned today in the Lorraine pit of the coal fields of which the centre is the village of Gerthe, about four miles from the city.

The day shift of 650 men had just descended into the workings and were distributing themselves along the various levels when a serious fire damp explosion occurred. The detonation was heard at the surface and the officials on duty immediately formed rescue parties who rushed back to the pit mouth together with the villagers. Eight injured miners were soon brought to the surface. The fate of the other 632 is not known.

The bodies of seven dead miners had up till 2 o'clock this afternoon been brought up from the Lorraine pit of the coal fields near the village of Gerthe, where a fire damp explosion imprisoned a large number of men early this morning. Sixteen miners have also been brought to the surface suffering from serious injuries.
