CATTLE EMBARGO PERMANENT

MR. GARDNER DECIDES THAT THE PROHIBITION MUST STAND.

The Official Report Published: The Cattle Board has published the official document concerning the prohibition of Canadian cattle. Mr. Gardner, President of the Board, has decided that the prohibition must stand.

The documents comprise the evidence of seven experts and a minute containing the Board's deductions.

No one testified positively that the cases were not cases of contagious pleuropneumonia. Many confirmed the decision of the officers of the Board. The Board considers that the evidence negatives the suggestion that the disease is catarrhal or contagious pleuropneumonia.

HUNTING THE CHINESE FLEET.

Japanese Battleships' Fright Quest—Both Countries Floating War Loans—End of the Kow-Shung Affair.

London, Aug. 17.—The Shanghai correspondent of the Central News says that by special imperial decree the Japanese Government has authorized a loan of \$50,000,000.

The Japanese Government has promised Admiral Fremantle, who commands the British squadron in East Asiatic waters, to give 48 hours' notice in case the Japanese fleet bombard Wei-Hai-Wei or Chee-Foo.

The eight vessels that passed Chee-Foo westward bound, on Aug. 14, were the Chinese fleet, which were fleeing from the Japanese cruisers. The fleet went to Luikung-tow, northwest of Chee-Foo, where it has been left undisturbed by the Japanese.

The finding of the court in the official investigation at Shanghai of the sinking of the Kow-Shung is that the Japanese naval vessel, and that Captain Kow-Shung showed great coolness and judgment under the trying conditions of the conflict. The court added that the Kow-Shung's English officers used all means in their power to avert the catastrophe, and deserved high praise for their efforts.

Torpedoes will be laid at the entrance of the Tokyo and Nagasaki harbors early next week.

The Shanghai correspondent of the Times confirms the supposition that the Japanese visit to Wei-Hai-Wei and Port Arthur, was merely a reconnaissance for the purpose of drawing fire and getting angles. The Japanese vessels have since been cruising in the Gulf of Pechili, seeking the Chinese fleet.

Battle Near Seoul Expected.
Victoria, B.C., Aug. 17.—When the steamship Empress of Japan, which has just arrived here, left Yokohama, reports of war and rumors of blockade filled the air. All along the Chinese coast, Japanese troops are being removed. Railway and telegraph lines were being hastily constructed in both China and Japan. Torpedoes had been laid at the entrance of all the rivers, and more ships and further supplies and ammunition were being ordered.

In Corea, China still appears to have the advantage. Numbers in her land force, though Japan is credited with having 200,000 men in the field, and more troops are being constantly landed by both belligerents. There is every prospect of a severe engagement in the neighborhood of Seoul before many days. Each of the European powers has landed a small force to protect its consular interests in the Korean capital. It is reported that the Korean Government has officially invited the Japanese to Japan that they will accept military sever all connections with China.

Hunting for the Chinese Fleet.
Yokohama, Aug. 17.—The Japanese are blocking the passes in the north of Corea in view of the presence of the Chinese fleet. It is said that the Japanese are seeking the Chinese fleet. Up to the present time the search has been unsuccessful.

Berlin Will Float the Chinese Loan.
Berlin, Aug. 17.—The Berlin Post says that a Chinese loan of £1,000,000 has been undertaken on the security of the Chinese maritime dues, and that further amounts will probably follow. It is believed that the loan is part of a gold loan of £1,500,000 in thirty years' bonds, which will be issued in London in September. It is said that Berlin banks will have a share in the issue of the loan, two-thirds of which is to be payable in China in silver.

IN NAGASAKI THREATENED?
The Pei Yang Squadron M. A. by Shortly A Week Back the Japanese Fleet.

Victoria, B.C., Aug. 17.—A private letter received by the steamer Tadocan announces that the Japanese fleet is expected to appear in the bay of Nagasaki, and that the great naval engagement of the war will be fought for the possession of Nagasaki, Japan, the best coaling station and the one nearest to China. The entire Pei Yang squadron is looked to as the attacking force, while Japan will concentrate the cream of her navy to assist land forces in the defence of the city.

The chief vessels of the Pei Yang fleet, which are in myriads, and their descent upon some portion of the Japanese coast are anticipated. The British fleet, consisting of the Orient, the Chinese, and the modern equipment, speed and strength.

An Oceanic Prince Arrested.
London, Aug. 17.—A despatch from Paris to the Exchange Telegraph Co. says Prince Emanuel of Orleans was arrested in Rome on the 15th inst. on his way to visit Emperor Franz Joseph of Austria.

Prince Emanuel is a nephew of the Empress Elizabeth of Austria. He recently applied for admission into the Austro-Hungarian army. Emperor Franz Joseph granted him the desired permission. The prince is expected to visit his aunt's commission soon after meeting the Emperor. No reason for his arrest has been given.

HE WILL ARRIVE TODAY AND WILL SPEND SUNDAY AT QUEENSTON.

Arrangements Made for Monday's Function—The Council Will Be Held at the Island Pavilion and at the Royal Canadian Yacht Club.

A roving cheer will greet Sir John Thompson at the Union Station on the arrival of the Muskoka Express at 4.30 this afternoon. Investigated by his secretary, the Premier is in the best of health. He had made arrangements for a visit to Nova Scotia, but so urgent was ex-Adm. Saunders in the Mayor's behalf and pleasant were Sir John's recollections of his visit to the Toronto Fair last year that he set his previous plans aside and accepted the Mayor's pressing invitation to see the harbor and inland works, and the invitation of the directors of the Muskoka Express, with the result that Toronto will have two visits from the Premier Minister of the Crown within a few days.

Sir John will be accompanied by Lady Thompson, and today he will be the guest of Mr. T. G. Blackstock, on Monday they will be the guests of the city and the Royal Canadian Yacht Club. On Monday they leave for Ottawa.

Mr. Blackstock has arranged a pleasant and quiet way for Sir John and Lady Thompson to spend Sunday, immediately on the arrival of the train this afternoon they will cross from the Union Depot to the beautiful yacht of Mr. Blackstock, the steamer "Aurora" they will sail for Queenston, where Sunday will be spent. SECRETARY GARLISLE MAY RETIRE
