Death of Mr. John Moffatt

Mr. John Moffatt, an old pioneer of Warwick, passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Charles Chambers, 4th line, on Sunday morning, aged 85 years, 3 months and 18 days. He had been a sufferer from rheumatism for some years and seven weeks ago he had a fall which caused him to take to his bed, where he remained until the time of his death.

Deceased was a native of Ireland, being born in the county of Tyrone, Sept. 24th, 1828. He was married in 1852 to Miss Margaret Sawyer, who predeceased him in 1898. About the year 1858, some six years after coming to Canada, he settled in the township of Warwick and lived in this district until his death. He is survived by four sons and four daughters, namely, Charles Moffatt, Forest; Robert, British Columbia; Andrew J. and J. C., 6th line, Warwick; Mrs. James, 6th line, Warwick; Mrs. Scofield; B. C.; Mrs. Charles Chambers, 4th line, and Mrs. Robt. Bryce, 6th line, Warwick, and also leaves 22 grandchildren and six great grandchildren. He passed through all the hardships and inconveniences incident to a pioneer life and took great interest in all matters pertaining to agriculture. In religion he was an Anglican. He was a staunch Orangeman and a member of that order from early manhood.

The funeral was held on Monday, Jan. 12th, to the Watford cemetery and was well attended although the weather was stormy and bitterly cold. The service was conducted by Rev. S. P. BROCKVILLE COUNCIL

At a meeting of the Council of the Township of Brockville, held at the Council Chamber, on Monday, Jan. 12th, 1914, the following business was transacted: The Council elected for the Township of Brockville for the year 1914, met in Code's Hall, in the Village of Alvinston, at the hour appointed by Statute. Present—William Annett, Reeve; William J. Bourne, Deputy Reeve; Douglas M. Campbell, Albert McCabe and Hugh Kennedy, Councillors. Declarations of Qualification and of Office were taken and subscribed before the Clerk, when they were declared ready for business.

Bourne—McCabe, that the sum of \$5.00 be voted to pay for six copies of the Municipal World, for use of Council and Clerk.—Carried.
McCabe—Kennedy, that the sum of \$5.00 be granted in aid of the Sick Children's Hospital, Toronto.—Carried.
Annett—McCabe, that W. G. Willoughby be reappointed as Assessor at a salary of \$50.00.—Carried.

Bourne—McCabe, that W. J. Seely be reappointed as Collector at a salary of \$100.00.—Carried.
Kennedy—Campbell, that as there are no officers or applicants for doing the Township printing for the coming year, that any advertising or printing not necessary to be done by the local paper, be left open to be done anywhere found cheaper or more convenient.—Carried.
Mr. Daniel Saunders complained that the Contractor for the Parker-Sisson Drain had left it to do other work, leaving the job unfinished, and that parties assessed for it had now paid the third annual on it.

Bourne—McCabe, that the Clerk notify Mr. Kelly, the Commissioner, to see that the job is gone on with, or relet same.—Carried.
Mr. Watt complained that the 67 con. road drain and the 7-8 con. blind line drain were left unlet and no work done on them, to the great injury of himself and others interested in the drains. He threatened to press a suit for damages unless action was taken.

Campbell—McCabe, that Wm. A. McDonald be reappointed Treasurer at the same salary as last year, viz.: \$30.—Carried.
Bourne—Annett, that Albert McCabe be appointed Commissioner for Division No. 1; Wm. Bourne for No. 2; Douglas M. Campbell for No. 3; Hugh Kennedy for No. 4; and Wm. Annett for Division No. 5.—Carried.
By-law No. 1 for 1914, introduced and read, confirming the appointments this day made, and the salaries as mentioned.—Carried.

Bourne—Campbell, that by-law be read a third time and finally passed.—Carried.
A. E. Sutton, ex-Councillor, sent in a report on the different drains over which he had been appointed Commissioner, giving in detail the amounts paid on each, and tendered his resignation.—Carried.

McCabe—Campbell, that Mr. Sutton's report be received, his resignation accepted, and that Mr. Annett be appointed Commissioner over the Johnston Drain and the Johnston-Mills Drain, and Mr. Kennedy as Commissioner over the 12-13 con. road drain.—Carried.

Annett—McCabe, that by-laws for the McKinlay Drain, the Brooke and Euphemis and Martin Creek Drains, the Brooke, Ennisville and Dawn Townline Drains, and the Edgar-Cores-tine Drain be read a third time and finally passed.—Carried.

Campbell—Kennedy, that Council do now adjourn to meet in the Village of Inwood, on Saturday, the 27th day of February, 1914.—Carried.
