During this time there was a boom in cheese factories, as many as six being in operation at one time; all are now closed except one. To-day Annapolis county is importing dairy and hog products. It is a burning shame and a disgrace, but it is true, that this County, richly endowed with all that is required by nature to preduce cheese, butter and pork, does not raise anough own consumption, but is compiled to import Ontario cheese and American pork. How

can that be remedied. By keeping more cows; where three or four, or at most six cows are now found, twenty could and should be kept. How can that be accomplished? By growing fodder, corn, coarse grains, oats etc. and by making ensilage. There are not twenty silos in Annapolis County. In the vicinity of Nictaux there are few, but the farmers appear to be singularly indifferent to the manifest advantages and value of ensilage. A small acerage will produce a large quantity of fodder corn, at a comparatively cheap rate, as compared with bay; corn can be grown in this county. The soil and climate are
