TORONTO., Aug. 5.—The attorney general gives an outline of his intended bill regarding the right of constables and others to vote. The bill provides for the submission ing the right of constables and others to vote. The bill provides for the submission of the question to the courts, and directs that the decision of these questions shall have precedence over all other business. Sections of the bill provide that petitions shall be tried during recess, and for post-ponement at the hearing of the same until the opinion of the court of appeal has been given. The bill declares that constables shall have the right to vote in future, and exempts those who have voted from the penalties should the court find they have voted improperly. The most important clause of the bill, and that which has the chief bearing upon the relative position of the two parties in the house, provides that if a member is unseated by reason of disallowance of the vote of constables or of any other persons, there shall be no election.
