Longmire, who has been absent from Bridgetown for the past twelve years, during the greater portion of which he has been a chartered accountant with a prominent business firm in Calgary, spent a few days last week at his former home in this town, where he was heartily greeted by his relatives and former acquaintances. He left Friday for Toronto where he will join the Royal Canadian Flying Corps. The MONITOR wishes him every success.

MARINE NEWS

The Yarmouth Trading Co.'s schrs. Wilford Snow and Viola, the only vessels out of Liverpool on Tuesday, landed about 8,000 lbs. of fresh fish upon their return to port that evening.

Capt. L. F. Barkhouse, of Westport, N. S., has engaged a shipyard at White's Cove, and is receiving timber for a 200 ton schooner, to be built there. Mr. Hilaire Boudreau is master builder.

Yarmouth Telegram: A representative of a South End fish company was in Shelburne this week with a view to purchasing two of Shelburne's fishing vessels, but as yet no sale has been effected.

Lunenburg Weekly News: Zwicker & Co., received a cable that schr. Waegwoltic, Capt. Craser, had arrived Feb. 18 at Bahia, Brazil, 32 days' passage from Nfld., will load cocoa for New York.

Messrs. P. A. Theriault & Co., intend launching their new schr. Charles Theriault at Belliveau's Cove, in about three weeks. They are now taking in timber for another schooner for immediate construction.

Word has been received by friends in Hantsport, N. S., from Capt. Andrew Davidson, stating that his steamer, the Allemania, was torpedoed on Dec. 10th in Spanish waters, while on the passage to Genoa. Capt. Davidson has just arrived in New York.

The launching of Dr. T. H. MacDonald's 800 ton four-masted schooner Rebecca L. MacDonald, named after the doctor's mother, has not yet taken place. It was hoped to have the new vessel, which was built at Meteghan, launched during the last high tides.

What is said to be the highest freight rate on a cargo of lumber from St. John to South Africa is going to the four-master Norwegian schooner William Nottingham. She was chartered at \$60 per 1000 feet and the freight money will amount to about \$60,000.

Annapolis Spectator: The rigging of the new three mast schooner on the stocks here, has been completed and her sails were bent this week ready to sail as soon as launched, the date of which will soon be announced. The sails were made by J. H. Edwards, of this town, and appear to be a handsome outfit.

Grave fears are entertained for the safety of the tern schr. Socony from a United States port bound to St. John's, Newfoundland. She has been out over a month and no word received as to her whereabouts. She was built last year at Little Brook, Digby Co., by Mr. Sidney St. Clair Jones and purchased by the Standard Oil Company, who had her named changed from "Recruit."

"Tides at the head of the Bay of Fundy" is the title of an interesting and valuable pamphlet just published by the Naval Service Department at Ottawa, prepared by Dr. W. Bell Dawson, superintendent of Tidal Surveys, and presents the latest deductions from observations of the tides in Cobequid Bay, Cumberland Basin, etc. All mariners of these waters should study it.
