

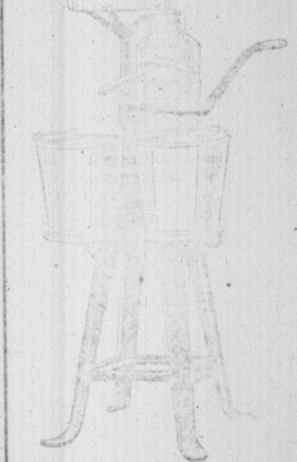

THE CANADIAN RED CROSS SOCIETY, NOVA SCOTIA DIVISION.

The Annual Report of the Nova Scotia Division of the Canadian Red Cross Society for 1923 has just been issued. It is an interesting booklet of 44 pages and presents a good appearance. "A Personal Message" from His Honor, Lieutenant Governor McCallum Grant over his facsimile signature, occupies the title pages, and is followed by notes of appreciation from Honorable E. H. Armstrong, Premier, and by Dr. A. C. Jost, Provincial Health Officer.

The Report contains the Minutes of the Annual Meeting which was held February 26th, 1924, together with full reports from all officers and departments of Red Cross work. The Report of the Commissioner, Dr. S. L. Walker indicates very plainly the broad scope and extent of the work coming under the Peace Time Programme.

The Report of the Veterans Workshops, which has been in operation in Halifax since July 1923, is illustrated by two full pages of cuts of the Shop on Robie St. Over 30 ex-soldiers, whose pension is not enough to give them a livelihood have been employed, and have by this employment become independent. From the success of this undertaking it should be an easy and natural step to establish sheltered workshops for all those industrially disabled.

The Report of the work at the Port Nursery, Pier Two, is also illustrated by two interior views. Thousands of immigrants to Canada will always remember the kindly welcome and assistance rendered by this voluntary committee of Red Cross workers.

This Annual Report, besides more definitely covering the work of the Division than in former years, has an added interest in that it has reports from Counties and Branch Societies. In subsequent reports these will be much increased as the provincial organization becomes more effective. TO MAKE IT EASY FOR NEW SETTLERS

Give Them Chance to Secure Farms For Little or no Capital.

Ottawa, Ont.—The problem of the intending farmer who arrives in Canada with little or no capital is occupying the land settlement branch of the Department of Immigration just now. A statement issued by Hon. J. A. Robb, says that recent surveys of the situation in Canada have disclosed that in many communities there are farms equipped with habitable buildings which can be had on very nominal first payments or without any cash deposits at all. In many cases there are settlers in the same district who are willing to lend machinery to new comers in exchange for labor. By taking advantage of these circumstances, it is believed that the road will be opened to a considerable number of British and European settlers with a knowledge of agriculture who find themselves with little capital at this time.

MOST COMPLETE VESSELS BUILT

Fire is Not Used or Needed on Four New Ocean-Going Dredges.

The four new ocean-going dredges designed by the United States Engineering Corps to clean American harbors of sand and silt are said to be the only human habitations since the dawn of civilization in which fire in some form is not used or needed. Everything is done by electricity.

Each vessel is 288 feet long and is propelled by electricity from generators driven by oil engines. All control is direct from the bridge, without reference to the engine room.

Fifty-six electric motors operate the dredging machinery and do all the work of the ship—from weighing the anchor to driving the electric fans that ventilate the crew's quarters.

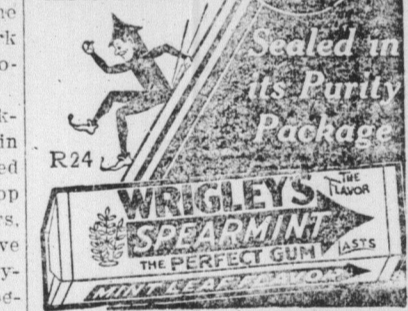

FISHERMAN EARN \$79.55 IN A DAY

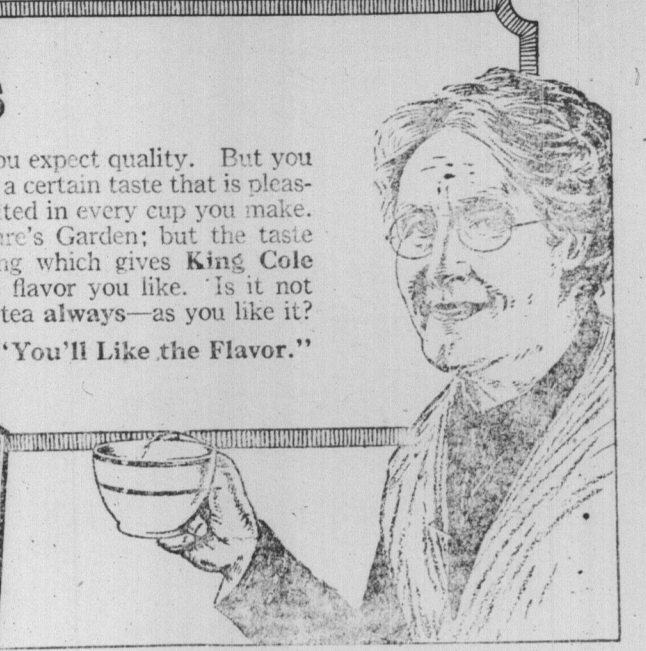

REGULARITY IN TRAIN SERVICE

People who travel as a rule dislike long waits for trains to arrive, or late arrivals at their destination. This is one line of effort which our Dominion Atlantic Railway is seeking to improve. The record of the past month will show that the travelling public here have little to complain of in irregularity of service as their trains are making exceptionally good records.

During the month of February the passenger trains on time showed a splendid record of 94% out of a possible 100%. This was even better for the month of March with the record average of passenger trains 94% on time, being an improvement of 1% over the previous month. During the month of March trains Nos. 2, 3, 4, 6, 96 and 97 were all 100% on time, with trains Nos. 1, 95 and 98 96% on time. When it is remembered the many varied things which go to delay trains we feel proud of this record, and think quite naturally our own Nova Scotia people are also appreciative of this.

It will be a matter of pride for the railway to continue to keep up this good record and improve it if possible. With the prospects of a heavy summer visitor travel those who desire to come to Nova Scotia for their vacation will be pleased to know they can expect a well equipped Bluenose service and regularity in arrival of trains with very few exceptions.

CITIZEN OPPOSE PROPOSAL TO STOP PORT WADE BRANCH

Petition to Minister of Railways Presents Six Arguments Against Discontinuing Service.

Granville Ferry.—A petition addressed to the Minister of Railways, against the proposed discontinuance of service on the Middleton-Port Wade branch of the C. N. R., has been signed by a large number of citizens. The petition submits the following considerations:

- 1. "The Government has at the present time given favorable consideration to the construction of Branch lines in the West and in the Maritime Provinces, which cannot be an immediate source of profit for the accommodation of certain areas. The Branch line which our petition refers to has been an accommodation to a large population for a period of over twenty years. Its removal will be a hardship on this population."
2. "There have been a number of apple packing houses constructed on this section of the road. The closing of all service will make these a loss."
3. "At Port Wade is one of the largest and best deep water piers in the province of Nova Scotia. Withdrawal of all maintenance will mean destruction of the road and pier."
4. "It is not proposed that the service be discontinued between Middleton and Bridgetown. The cost of maintaining a weekly service from Bridgetown to Port Wade would be more than compensated for in the benefit to the locality."
5. "It is a step backward."
6. "The municipality of Annapolis is interested in the road."

KENTVILLE GAME ASSOCIATION FORMED.

Kentville.—A Game Association was formed in Kentville to be known as the Fish, Forest and Game Protective Association of Kentville and vicinity. The meeting was largely attended and enthusiastic.

Addresses bearing on the subject were given by R. W. Tutts, Wolfville Migratory Bird and game officer; and J. E. Hales, Wolfville, who told of the work their Association was doing at Wolfville and surrounding country. The Association is formed on lines similar to the Wolfville Association.

A resolution was passed supporting the Bill now before the Legislature prohibiting the sale of Moose Meat for the next three years. The officers elected were as follows:

President, H. Oyley; Vice-President, C. W. Fair; Secretary-Treasurer, J. R. Webster; Executive of six members, J. H. Cox, Cambridge; K. L. Pines, Ralph Redden, W. E. Webster, E. H. Dodge, Kentville, and Aincer Corcoran, South Alton.
