## Jews in Rome.

The Jewish periodicals are making a lament over the dissolution of the synagogue at Rome. It would appear that the members are no longer required by the law to contribute to its support, and they are taking advantage of their liberty. There are still a few devoted men who are willing to bear any burdens, but an extraordinary apathy has affected the majority, and not only the places of worship, but the denominational schools are deserted. Parents send their children to the Roman Catholic schools, and do not even take the trouble to see that they are relieved from attendance when religious instruction is given. The Jews in Rome number about 5000.

In England.—The two leading Presbyterian bodies in England are likely to unite this year. The opposition on the part of the U. P. body is strong-in proportion of 30 to 50; still they go forward.

AMONG THE HEATHEN.-We read with pleasing surprise of the proceedings of Presbyteries in China, Japan, Siam, India, West Africa, Brazil, Egypt, and so forth. Even in old Bible Lauds, Presbytery is litting up its head.
