IMMUNITY AND ANAPHYLAXIS: A CONSIDERA-TION OF SOME CURRENT PROBLEMS, AND A NOTE ON SERUM AND VACCINE THE-RAPY.

In a recent article Moss (1) in recording his experiences during a year spent in visiting the laboratories of Europe and England, noted that the activities of the great majority of the foremost workers in the field of scientific medicine to-day were in studies which might all be included under the title "Immunity and anaphylaxis." This is indeed noteworthy and in sharp contrast to what a student of two or three decades ago would have found to be the case. At that time Virchow and his followers in the school of cellular pathology or histopathology dominated the first of laboratory investigators in medicine, and the hallmark was the ability to differentiate, to trace and to elucidate pathological deviations in the structure of the various body tissues. 1908, Ehrlich and Metchnikoff were awarded the Nobel prize in medicine for having (as was probably conceived
