

to the public interest. With few early advantages Mr. Kelly gained for himself a high place in his chosen profession of law and ethics in the business in which he was engaged. As a member of the legislative council of the province of Quebec, as an appointed member of the legislative council and as a member without portfolio in the government of Quebec, he gave to the public provisions and amendments. In this way he joined the professional competence of the Irish race and an ever present and kindly interest in the welfare of his fellowmen.

Since his arrival in Dublin Mr. Kelly quickly and effectively worked for the Canadian Irish good will. His reports to the government have been of much value and it has been a great satisfaction to myself and others to receive his reports. His work has been welcomed by the people of this country which has been paid by Premier de Vaux to his personal qualities, his zeal and his devotion as itself an indication of the loss which both countries have suffered by Mr. Kelly's passing.
