The Budget-Mr. Benidickson

would perhaps not expect much flexibility from the well known pugnacious Minister of Finance (Mr. Fleming). However, the flexibility is certainly to be found in the rapidity with which a financial statement can go from a surplus of \$12 million to a deficit of almost \$300 million in the course of six or seven months.

Perhaps you, Mr. Speaker, would like me to move the adjournment of the debate.

An act respecting technical and vocational training assistance.

An act for the establishment of a national productivity council.

An act for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of money for the public service of the financial year ending the 31st March, 1961.
