Indian Reserve No. 2, surveyed as Lot 10000, Group 1; all of Lower Kootenay Indian Reserve No. 3, surveyed as Lot 10001, Group 1; all that portion of Lower Kootenay Indian Reserve No. 5, surveyed as Lot 10003, Group 1, which lies South of a line drawn East and West approximately 12 chains South of the North Boundary of Section thirty-two (32) Township eight (8) of the lands of the Lower Kootenay Indian Band held in trust by the Crown according to the terms of surrender of October 1, 1934?

Hon. Judd Buchanan (Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development): The Department has no record of written or other authority to Creston Reclamation Company to transfer or otherwise dispose of any interest in their lease on the Kootenay Indian Reserves.

EXCISE TAX COLLECTED ON AIRCRAFT

How much excise tax has been collected through the 10 per cent tax imposed on all privately owned (non-commercial) aircraft since the budget announcement of 1974?

Hon. Jack Cullen (Minister of National Revenue): The amount of Excise Tax paid on private aircraft owned by

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individuals is not available. The Excise Tax paid to January 31, 1976 on aircraft owned by individuals and corporations for which no exemption was available, was \$2,594,208.55.
