practice of enrolling all recruits in the Militia Unit first and then into the Overseas Unit; had we done so, the C.O.T.C. Contingent would have exceeded 700.

The Military Committee feels that the McGill C.O.T.C, is entitled to these Honours as it was solely responsible for the organization of the Battalion and, with few exceptions, entirely officered it; further, that the possession of these Honours will serve to perpetuate one of the war activities of the University and form part of the traditions of the C.O.T.C.

If you consider the matter sufficiently important, the Committee would appreciate your taking it up with the Militia authorities.

I shall be glad to call and see you at any time should you desire it.
