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Impartial Account, &c.

EARLY in the spring of the year 1758, when the plan of operations for the then ensuing campaign, was the subject of deliberation in our military councils; Lieutenant Col. Bradstreet, from a knowledge of the strength and situation of the enemy's fort at Cadaraqui, and their usual military oeconomy, judg'd an attempt upon Fort Frontenac (whilst the whole force of Canada was employ'd in opposing our incursion into their country on the side of Lake George) to be attended with the utmost probability of success. The reduction of which, in its consequences, would undoubtedly be of the highest importance

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
