The biggest surprise of the local tennis world this year occurred in the Varsity tourney yesterday, when Miss Fairbairn and McEachern, representing Varsity, defeated Miss Moyes and Glasco, the Canadian and Ontario champions, and incidentally their first defeat on Canadian courts. The champions started at a terrific pace, and with apparent ease took the first set, 6-2, and led in the second one, 4-2. At this stage the younger team took a complete reversal of form, and by excellent hitting and team work won the next four games and set, much to the surprise of their opponents and the numerous spectators. The final score was 6-2, 2-6, 6-2, 6-2, 6-2. Both pairs were out to win, but the Toronto Club team steadily pulled ahead, the score standing 2-6, love then 5-2.
