GENERAL MINES CO. **GETTING OFF TO** A GOOD START

Takes Over Green-Meehan Power Plant and Begins Active Development --- Working Various Properties.

COBAIT, Nov. 14.—The General Mines Co. has taken possession of and started in operation the Green-Meehan power plant, from which they will furnish air to the drills operating on the Red Rock. Possession was taken under the terms of the lease of the Red Rock from the original Green-Meehan Company, which lease includes the right of half the power developed. The General Mines Co. will continue to use the Agaunico plant to supply power for that property and the Cobalt Contact, to which a long pipe line has been run.

Work on the properties of the General Mines is progressing and good results are being obtained in the extraction of milling ore. Occasional lenses of high-grade are encountered, but the run of the workings at present is at low-grade bodies.

At the Agaunico a shipment of ore is being prepared and this will be sent to the company's smelter at Kingston, the Buffalo Ontario Smelting Co.

The General Mines Co. was formed a few weeks ago to acquire property in Hastings, Peterboro and Frontenac counties, and also leases options on the Cobalt Contact, Ruby and Red Rock properties at North Cobalt.
