MAYOR CALLED POLICEMAN TO QUIET AN ALDERMAN

Culmination of Bickering in Windsor Council Chamber— Had Its Effect.

Windsor, June 20.—(Special.)—A rather unusual feature of last night's meeting of the city council was the presence of a police officer, who was called in by Mayor Ernest S. Wigle to preserve order in the council chamber.

The trouble arose out of a controversy between the mayor and Ald. Hamilton Trumble as to the proper disposition of certain routine matters coming before the council.

Ald. Trumble was not satisfied at the methods of the chief magistrate, and said so in terms more forcible than elegant. Ignoring Trumble, Mayor Wigle turned to Clerk Lusted and requested him to have an officer sent up at once. Within five minutes Constable Giles, one of the largest men on the force, marched into the chamber and took up his position close to Ald. Trumble.

The sight of the officer had a quieting effect on the bickering alderman, and he subsided and gave no further trouble. The officer, however, remained until the council adjourned.

Last year Ald. Trumble had a large following among the aldermen, and several times succeeded in bringing local legislation to a complete standstill. This year, however, he is hopelessly in the minority, but, nevertheless, has several times attempted to force the mayor's hand. Last night's episode was the culmination of the matter.

PEOPLE TO ELECT AUDITORS. Change From Present Plan to be Considered. It is possible that the city audit department may be reorganized. Before the city legislation committee yesterday, Ald. Oliver's motion, that the auditor constitute separate department under the board of control, was considered. The city solicitor advised the Municipal Act provided for the appointment of the auditors by the city council, whereas Controller Jones believed the people should elect the auditors. The committee will gather some data before coming to a decision.

IRISH MEMBERS REFUSE TO SUPPORT MOBILE ROUTE. (Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, June 20.—Owing to friction with the Great Northern Railway in Ireland, many of the Irish party are declining to sign the memorial to Sir Wilfrid Laurier requesting the continuance of the Mobile service by which the company profits.

CLYDESDALES FOR CANADA. (Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, June 20.—Fifty-five well-registered Clydesdales have been shipped from Glasgow to Canada.

HAPPENINGS IN HAMILTON RULES FOR FIRE DEPARTMENT

Alderman Would Wipe One Out—Synod Closes—Grocers' Guild Case.

Hamilton, June 20.—(Special.)—The fire and water committee this evening agreed to spend over \$7000 on extending the waterworks system. Chief Ten Eyck made a kick about having to turn out to so many rubbish heap fires, and the parks board of health will be asked to make restrictions about the materials taken to the dumps. Ald. Church objected because the firemen who report late for duty twice in six months lose their day off. He said he would try and have the rule wiped out. A. Stinson and B. McSwaney were added to the department, and J. Bell to the substitute list.

At a special meeting of the city council this afternoon the park route for John Patterson's Hamilton, Waterloo & Guelph Railway was approved of, subject to the report of an independent engineer. Mayor Biggar and Ald. Whitton and Stewart were named to pick out the engineer, and selected E. H. Wingate. The council also approved the agreement the government proposes to enter into with the Toronto and Niagara Power Company. The council will ask the government to cut the company's right of way down to 40 feet. The aldermen are not satisfied over the announcement that the government intends to take over control of the Beach from the city, and to appoint two commissioners to govern it.

Andrew Carnegie has been asked if he has any money to spare for the new public library and art gallery building. He has not replied yet.

A meeting called by Supt. Fisher of the T. H. & B. was held in the council chamber this evening to boom the project of erecting a statue in honor of Sherring and other noted Canadians. A resolution was passed endorsing the scheme. The proposal is to place the statue at the entrance of the library building. Ald. Stewart presided, and among the speakers were Mr. Fisher, C. R. McCullough, George S. Kerr, Rev. Dr. Lyle, W. H. Wardrop, K.C., and Philip McRobert.

Mrs. Cartwright, wife of C. W. Cartwright of the Landed Banking & Loan Co., died this evening at her residence, 22 South Bay Street. She was 70 years old. Her husband, John Cartwright, 18 Northeast-avenue, died last night.

The meeting of the Niagara synod closed this evening with a service at Christ Church Cathedral in honor of the tenth anniversary of Bishop Dumoulin's appointment as bishop. An address was presented to his lordship. A collection was taken up at the close of the service for a church home.

The evidence against the Dominion Wholesale Grocers' Guild, which was heard to-day at the police court, and the defence is now presenting its side of the case. It is expected that Thursday's session will bring up the case of Hugh Blain of Eby, Blain & Co., Toronto, and H. N. Klitson gave evidence to the effect that the Guild's operations did not enhance the price of meat.

They said the Guild had never refused to sell to any legitimate wholesale firm. Committee for Trial.

William and Mrs. Ferguson and A. W. Leroux were this morning committed for trial on the charge of shoplifting. It is charged that they stole a glass bowl from Robert Junor's store.

Yankee Goods in Canada. N. Y. Commercial: It is difficult for Englishmen to understand why, notwithstanding tariff preferences, political ties, sentiments of patriotism and loyalty, and perhaps other considerations, Canada still insists upon buying so many things from the United States, and so few from Great Britain.

Not one of the English journalists, trade emissaries and statisticians who have studied the problem has come up with a satisfactory conclusion as W. D. Scott, superintendent of immigration at Ottawa. In a recent paper on Canadian progress in population, Mr. Scott after admitting that Canada likes and looks for American immigrants, made the significant statement that the American immigrants constantly finding their way into Canada as the personal property of immigrants, and they are there advertising themselves, convincing the Canadians of their merits and irresistibly creating a further demand. The essence of the whole subject is that American goods more naturally find their way into Canada than any others, making themselves appreciated, and giving a good reputation to everything that the United States makes, and compel a demand that the Canadian importers are forced to recognize.

Desperate Criminals. A little boy 12 years old was sentenced to eight days' imprisonment for highway robbery because he scratched a penny tin trumpet from another boy in the street. Two other boys, each 13 years old, were sentenced to three weeks and a week, respectively, for stealing 28 pounds of wheat from trucks in the railway station.
