CANADA'S POSITION.

What bothers the Americans at the present time is their realization of the fact that Canada has a mind and a will of its own; that it does not intend to see its interests sacrificed by the Mother Country, that it refuses to be bulldozed by the United States. Our neighbors have at last perceived that their policy of starving Canada into annexation has failed miserably to accomplish its purpose.

Canada with a treaty in one hand and a club in the other, who say to the Dominion, 'Accept our treaty, or you will feel the weight of this club,' seem to forget that we are dealing with people of the Anglo-Saxon race—a people whose motto has always been, 'Nemo me impune lacessit.'

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE VOQUE. To Live Well Use CONVIDO PORT WINE

Brilliant Audience in Massey Hall Hears an Able Exposition of the Cult. MAYOR SHAW IS NOW A CONVERT. His Worship Frays the Followers of Mrs. Edith-What They Believe and Why.

Under the auspices of First Church of Christ, Scientist, Queen's Avenue and Cnr. Howell-street, Mr. Carol Norton, C.S.D., of New York, gave his popular lecture on Christian Science in Massey Hall last evening. The audience was an inspiring one, the building, with the exception of the top gallery being filled.

His Personality. The lecturer is young and fluent; a pleasant speaker and of agreeable appearance. He wore the emblematic white dower of a blameless life in the lapel of his neatly fitting Prince Albert coat. His generalization was graceful, his illustrations forcible. There was no sign of the conventional cleric about him, and his lecture was more intelligent or attentive audience than that which nearly filled Massey Hall last night.

Nothing Revolutionary. In considering "Christian Science Alias the Healing and Saving Power of Christianity," Mr. Norton's scientific basis of Christianity. Mr. Norton was pleased to call it the "Gospel of Christian Science." It is, said he, a new revelation of the evangelist; it is only different from other systems in that it opposes His teaching and leave half of it, the dormant element of 20th century Christianity.

Christ Not a Wonder-Worker. Christ was naturally all He professed to be. He did not pose as a wonder-worker. He went about doing good to the bodies and souls of men. In this connection Mr. Norton gave a word-picture of Christ's work on earth. He cast out devils, which was simply transforming the nature, He gave a sure promise, "The work that I do shall ye also do." In that utterance a proof positive that He never meant that the age of miracles should pass. He said further, "These signs shall follow them that believe in my name; whosoever they cast out devils; they shall take up serpents, and if they drink any deadly thing it shall in no wise hurt them; they shall lay hands on the sick and they shall recover." The lecturer declared that this was a special dispensation for that age, but was for all coming generations, and his truth had been proved by Christian Scientists.
