IT WAS A \$20,000 BLAZE.

Harris' Glue Factory Will Be Rebuilt Without Delay-25 Men Out Temporarily.

The loss occasioned by the fire which oc curred early on Saturday morning at W. Harris & Co.'s give factory on Danforthavenue is estimated at about \$20,000. This is partially covered by ansurance in a number of companies, principally the Moyal and Union. The origin of the blaze is a mystery. There was absolutely no fire in the building, and the only explanation seems to be that incendiaries caused the blaze. From 60 to 65 men were employed in the works, and about half of these will be thrown out of work. The firm has other factories, and will rebuild the glue works at once. The factory being out of the city, the owners had to depend on their own fire appliances and the help of neighbors to extinguish the fire.
