There were three classes of speakers—the practical man, sometimes uncouth in his language; the trained speaker, who sometimes had dangerously little knowledge, and the scientist. Sometimes, but rarely, the three characteristics were combined in one man—more often it would be found necessary to have a corps of workers who, combined, would cover the entire course of the work. The scientist who aimed to become an efficient institute worker should acquire


